LIMERICK—DECEMBER 8, 1807.

A Prussian vessel, laden with timber and deals, put into this river in distress yesterday; she was boarded off Scatterry by a Lieut. of the Helena sloop of war, who took possession of her, and sent her up this river. The master of the Prussian reports, that he was boarded to the S. W. of the Blaskets, by a large lugger French privateer, full of men, who gave him permission to make the first port he could, his vessel being in a leaky condition.—The Prussian was bound for St. Ubes.

Friday last about twelve o'clock, two men went into the shop of Mr. Rd. Coyne, bookseller, East Arran-street, Dublin, having the appearance of gentlemen, and asked for Hume's England and Thompson's Works, one of them offered ten guineas for Hume, the other bought Thompson's Works and gave a five guinea note in payment, when Mr. Coyne gave him the change out of a parcel of notes that were in his shop desk; after he gave the change, one of them asked leave to write a note at his desk, to which Mr. Coyne consented, and whilst he was writing, the other villain occupied Mr. Coyne's attention in asking the price of Gibbon's Decline and Fall and other works, when done writing he gave his address on the books as Joseph Dwyer, Esq. Dawson-street Hotel, and went away. Immediately after Mr. Coyne went to his desk and missed bank notes to a considerable amount, also a promissory note drawn by Mr. Cornelius O'Hara, in favour of Thomas Coyle, Capel-street at 61 days, from the 1st inst. amounting to 10l. He who called himself Dwyer was a tall genteel looking man, dark complexion and black hair, large whiskers that came down his neck and chin, dark surtout, buckskin breeches and boots. The other was a small thin meagre man, with a blue coat and pantaloons; they both had an English accent.—Unfortunately the numbers of the notes are not known.

Yesterday a man of the name of Mathew Martin, a hackney driver, went into a public-house, opposite the Exchange, and after taking a small quantity of liquor, instantly expired.

Messrs. Bourke and Co. having last night received a licence for distilling spirituous liquors, will commence that process immediately.

Messrs. Whites and Co. expect to receive their licence for distilling by this night's post, when they will also commence.

Wednesday two respectable persons, in the city of Dublin, were taken into custody, on a charge of forging mercantile stamps.

The brig Juno, of Cambeltown, was wrecked on Thursday last, near Sanda, with a cargo of merchants goods from Dublin to Derry, worth ten thousand pounds; both vessel and cargo quite gone, crew saved.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer has ordered a supply of forty carts laden with copper coin to be sent to the forces in the southern district.

Yesterday, were committed by Godfrey Massy, Esq. to our county jail, — Bradshaw, Owen Conway, John Barry, and Poll Lundregan, charged on the oath of Winifred Kennedy, with being principals in the banditti that on the night of the 11th of October last, set fire to Laurence Bourk's house of Chantersland, county Tipperary, which was consumed, and John Dogherty burned to death in it, and David Bourk killed.
