The ship *Alarm*, Captain Stevens, which sailed from Cork on the 23d ult. bound for Bristol, was totally lost, and every soul on board perished: we are much concerned to state that Mrs. John Mans, of Mallow, and Miss Mary Maunsell, of this city, were amongst the unfortunate sufferers.

It is with the deepest regret that we announce to the public the loss of his Majesty's frigate *Porreas*, 32 guns, Captain Scott, with the Captain and the whole of her crew, except two officers and 50 seamen. This most melancholy intelligence is brought by the Rover packet arrived at Weymouth from Guernsey and Jersey.—The shipwreck took place in consequence of the frigate's striking on a sunken rock on the Jersey coast, when she almost immediately filled and went down. The above are all the particulars that have as yet transpired relative to the unfortunate event.
