

Limerick, Feb. 8.

The public will hear with pleasure, that all the reports from Vigo, about 50 in number, and which had been very much dispersed by the tempestuous weather, have arrived at different British ports. The Alfred, had Generals Crauford, Alten, Rufon, and Dyott, on board.

A letter has been received by a respectable house in this City, from a Captain of the 50th Regt. dated aboard the Ville de Paris, Spithead, Jan. 29th 1809, after paying a deserving tribute in the most honorable terms, to the memory of Lieut. John Cooper Wilson, whose death was mentioned in our paper, that the Regt. in every respect did honor to old Ireland, from which the ranks were filled. One received the fatal wound in charging, making his death almost instantaneous.—Some evening before his death was interred, with that of another warrior Major Stanhope. The remains of the Regiment arrived in England, will be quartered at Bourne Lees, Kent.

A letter was yesterday received from Ensign James Phillips, 45th Regt. to his Mother in this City, dated Almeida, Dec. 18, stating, "that Regiment with the other Troops which marched from Lisbon under Sir John Moore, was then on its progress, being within 20 leagues of Salamanca; it is probable that as a junction was not effected previous to the battles between his army & that of the French, at the 45th and other Regiments under General Kenzie, endeavoured to make their retreat for Lisbon, which it is devoutly to be hoped was effected, although the distance was about 200 miles. We have accounts from the latter place to the 25th of December, which are perfectly silent on that point. Since our last, it gives us pleasure to state, that accounts have been received which mention the death (after the battle of Corunna) of Major Aylmer, 1st foot, Lieut. John Vincent, 36th, and Lieut. John White, 71st; and also of the arrival in England of Lieut. Jonas Welsh, 5th foot, and Lieut. Gerald Fitzgerald, 38th, all connected in this City.—also Lieutenants David and Arthur Johnson, of the 5th foot, sons of William Johnson, Esq. of Creaves in this County and nephew to Sir Richard Harte.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased to appoint this day for a general Fast and Humiliation, the same was observed in this City with due solemnity—public business was suspended, and Divine service performed in all the Churches, Chapels and Meeting Houses. The Right Worshipful John Crips, Esq. Mayor, the Sheriffs, Recorder and Corporation went to the Cathedral, when an excellent suitable discourse was preached by the Rev. Henry Gubbins, from Jonah, Chap 3, V. 4—"Yet forty days and Nineveh shall be overthrown."

The Lord High Chancellor of Ireland, has been pleased to appoint George Massey, of Glenwilliam, Esq. a Justice of the Peace and Quorum, for this County, to be also a Magistrate for the Co. Cork.
