Letters from Lisbon state, that a French army, of 5,000 men, was advancing in three columns, under Count Victor and Lassus.

It is now ascertained, that the British fleet destroyed, was destined for South America. The coal price is therefore available.

Yesterday morning Lord Cochrane held a short conference with Lord Mulgrave, at his residence at the Admiralty. It is rumoured, but we do not know that it is entitled to belief, that Lord Cochrane has been dissatisfied with the conduct of Lord Gambier in the recent battle in Basque Roads, and has signified as much to the Admiralty. Lord Gambier has for the present relinquished the command of the Fleet off Rochefort, for the purpose of preferring charges against Admiral Harvey.

His Majesty's ship *Lavinia* is appointed convoy for the East Indies, as is the *Solebay* for Africa, and the *Alert* for Newfoundland. The East India Fleet will be dispatched this day from Portsmouth. The West India and Mediterranean convoys, 100 sail, with a fine breeze, under convoy of the *Success*, *Helder*, and *Royal*, sailed on Saturday from Portsmouth. The Baltic Fleet, 40 sail, left Yarmouth on Saturday for Gortheim, &c.

Sir H. B. Neale's report to Ministers has removed the expectation of any further advantage being, at present, attainable over the enemy at Rochefort.

Letters in town from Manchester state, that some disturbances have taken place there relative to local regulations among the manufacturers, who set fire to one or two looms. Order was restored by the military, and fortunately but little damage was done.

The Admiralty, the Horse-Guards and Pay-Office, the Public Office in Downing-street, the Municipalities and the Post-Office, were illuminated in honor of the victory in Basque Roads.

The troops in the Essex district have been directed to hold themselves in readiness for foreign service; and the 24th regiment of infantry has also been ordered from Guernsey to embark immediately for Lisbon.

Plymouth, April 20.—Passed by to the westward, a large convoy of transports with cavalry, for Lisbon, and having on board the *Surveillance* 34, Gen. Sir A. Wellesley, K. B. As the wind is at N. N. E. they will be at Lisbon in three or four days.

DUBLIN—APRIL 27.

A communication made to us from London very late on Monday evening states, that letters of the 21st instant, from Lisbon, mention that the French army was within thirty-five hours of the capital city—in fact that the re-embarkation of the British troops was apprehended from their movements. This account, however, received no credit in London. Some treachery, it is added, was discovered in Lisbon, which rendered the most summary and exemplary punishment necessary.—*Irish Times.*

Wardle, Coke, Curwen, Whitbread, and Alderman Combe, were among those who delivered their political sentiments upon the occasion, and urged the necessity of Reform. Mr. Wardle, in his speech, asserted that he knew nothing of Mr. Clarke until he hunted her out of her testimony, and desired any improper connection with her.—Sir Francis Burdett was prevented from attending by indisposition.
