

no novel nature—a repetition of the old Continental war—for money, of which the trifling sum of Six millions will satisfy the present demand of Austria.— compliance of the British Government with this moderate and modest demand will not a little accelerate the operations of Bonaparte, as he will thus be assured of the ability of Austria to sustain the contributions which will doubtless, without much delay, impose on that happy country.

Yesterday Prince Stahremberg, the Spanish and Portuguese Ambassadors, most of the Cabinet Ministers, and Lord William Bentinck, dined with Mr. Canina. The Government this morning received accounts from Lisbon of a very favorable nature. They were brought by the Statira, which sailed from Lisbon on the 25th ult. A. Wellesley had arrived there on the 2nd, after a voyage of seven days.—Our army was in the field, and advancing towards Oporto, which there was very little doubt would soon surrender. The reports of the presence of a large French army under Gen. Victor, on the eastern frontiers of Portugal, appear to be wholly without foundation. Victor, according to the latest accounts, remained at Merida. Gen. Beresford is indefatigable in his exertions to organize the Portuguese.

The day before the Statira sailed from Lisbon, the Amph, 74, and upwards of 70 sail of transports, full of troops, arrived in the Tagus, and immediately began to disembark. By the Statira we have received Portuguese papers to the 17th ult. They contain no intelligence of any decisive action, either in Spain or Portugal.—The Spanish Generals Urbino, La Pena, and Morena had been convicted of having sold the army of Andalusia, as well as that of Cuesta, to the French Generals opposed to them. Gen. Cuesta's head-quarters were at Mastaro; he had been joined by 15,000 fresh troops, and daily expected to have an action with the French. Accounts had been received at Lisbon from Catalonia, stating that the Generals Reding, the Marquis Lazun, and Francisco Rafox, had formed a junction with an army of 50,000 men, and were driving the French before them.

The Trompeuse sloop of war, picked up the last French Bulletins at sea. They were brought out by a small boat which attracted the notice of the Trompeuse, and after a short chase, was observed to throw overboard a small cask enclosing the Papers, with a flag, to render it conspicuous, and afterwards made sail for Calais.
