For every Tub made as specified in the Butter Act of 1809 shall not be less than 24 inches Bottom pegged and dowelled thick, provided such Tub shall weigh in the Weigh-house of Limerick Branded by the Committee being filled with Butter—
For every Fullbound Firkin the Weigh-house of Limerick be found to be sufficiently pickle, whether such Firkin Tared in Limerick or not—
The Committee think it necessary to inform of Farmers wishing extracts from the Act determined to enforce the provisions

BE it therefore enacted, that on the first Day of August, 1809, no Person shall buy or sell any empty Cask for Sale or Export, unless such Cask shall conform to the following dimensions:—Casks called Tubs, shall not be more than twenty-one inches in diameter at the Head and Bottom; Casks called Firkins, shall not be more than eight inches in diameter at the Head and Bottom; Casks called Kegs, shall not be more than fourteen inches in diameter at the Head and Bottom; and no Cask shall be used for the contrary notwithstanding.

And be it further enacted, that on the said first Day of August, 1809, no Person shall make Casks, Tubs, Firkins, or Kegs, for Sale or Export, of any other dimensions than those specified in this Act: or, if any Person shall make any Cask, Tub, Firkin, or Keg, of any other dimensions than those specified therein, every Person shall be liable to a fine of 10s. for each such Cask, Tub, Firkin, or Keg, so made.

And be it further enacted, that no Person shall be lawful for any Weigh-Master to weigh any Cask, Tub, Firkin, or Keg, unless he shall have previously taken off from any Cask, Tub, Firkin, or Keg, brought to be weighed, all such marks as are above the riddle of such Cask, Tub, Firkin, or Keg, to apply the same to his own use, or to the contrary notwithstanding.
