

Earl of Chatham has given the necessary orders for the immediate departure, as Commander in Chief of the great Expedition. His Lordship is not to be present in the Ordnance department—Sir Thomas Bouverie, as deputy, will preside at the head of that office, in his Lordship's absence.

Orders are said to have issued for a rigorous and general embargo in every port in the United Kingdom.—Several officers were in waiting the entire of Saturday at the Custom House.

A bill for £100,000, drawn in favor of Joseph Bonaparte, Government, has, within these few days been presented to a great Mercantile House in the City, holding sums belonging to the legitimate Government of France. It was transmitted by one of the first Houses in London. Payment was refused.

In the last month several waggons loaded with goods from Napoleon to Alexander, passed through the port, on their route from Paris to Petersburg.—The goods are valued at three millions of florins.

A party in Sweden hostile to the English interest, is very busy, and we are concerned to find, to a certain extent, successful in the propagation of a report, that the Government of so large a British naval force in the Baltic had for its object the seizure of the Swedish Navy at Cronobona, and that the new Government, apprised of this enterprize, had made preparations to defeat it.

The Duke of Gordon's trial is to stand over till November, at the Old Bailey, Miss Mary York, was yesterday indicted for maliciously firing a gun at Robert Paine. The particulars of this case have been already published in this paper, and the evidence now given was to the same effect. Messrs. Rolf gave the young lady an excellent character. Sir A. Chambre, summing up, observed, that nothing had been adduced in evidence to connect her with a malicious intention, and it was more than probable that the prisoner only intended to frighten the prosecutor. The Jury, without hesitation, acquitted her.

Robert Paine, the celebrated Philanthropist, died at New York, on the 8th ult.

We understand that the American Consul here has received information from the American Consul at Amsterdam that the existing state of affairs between the United States and France rendered it hazardous to send American vessels, particularly with colonial produce, to proceed at this time to the ports of Holland and France, which had already arrived, were under difficult and embarrassing circumstances. Tobacco, opium, and pot-ashes, however, are allowed by law to enter the ports on a view of all circumstances, those concerned in the trade judge of the risk they run in proceeding there at this moment.

London, July 2.—Reports were in circulation here, last night, but could not be traced to any source, that a great engagement had taken place between the British and the French, in which the latter had been defeated. The report went so far as to say, that Bonaparte was wounded and taken prisoner.—This morning the above report was renewed by letters received from Deal to the same effect. The report was said to have been brought by the Captain of a gun-brig from off the fishing station, who had been taken in with one of the licensed smugglers, from whom he had obtained a Dutch paper of a late date, wherein the above account was inserted. It is further stated, that an officer from the gun-brig had set off by express to London with the intelligence.

Yesterday, at the Commission of Oyer and Terminer, in Green-street, Arthur O'Leary, was capitally indicted for putting away as genuine, a forged and counterfeit Bank of Ireland Note, purporting to be of the value of £100. Several witnesses were examined, after which the Jury retired, and returned a verdict of guilty.—Death of Michael Toole, for having in his possession, forged Bank notes—acquitted.

Samuel Coates, Esq. was arraigned upon an indictment not capitally laid, for a robbery from an apartment in the Commercial Buildings in St. Andrew's parish, of a considerable number of bank notes, and a valise the contents of R. Dobbs, Esq.

Arthur Preston, Dean of Limerick, (brother of Lord Tara) and his Lady, (daughter of the Archbishop of Tuam) arrived at Mt. Shannon, near this city.

The Archbishop of Tuam, Lord and Lady Tara, the Hon. Mrs. Plunket, Col. Bagwell, and Bateman, Messrs. Croker, Monnerhasset, Bousfield, Roche &c. are amongst the latest arrivals at Cheltenham from Ireland.

Yesterday, the Rt. Hon. Lord Chief Baron and family arrived at the house of his brother Darby O'Grady, Esq. in this City. His Lordship will open the Assizes for the Co. Clare, at Ennis, on Tuesday next.

Right Hon. Lord Carbery, and George Evans, Esq. arrived on Thursday, at Bruff, in this County, where their purpose remains for some days.

This day Lieutenant-Colonel Augustine Fitzgerald, M.P. arrived from his Regiment, and proceeded for his seat at Carrigoran, Co. Clare.

The body of John Lillis, a Lad belonging to a Turf Boat, who was drowned on Thursday last, was last night brought to this City, and an inquest is to be this day holden by the Rt. Worshipful J. Crisp, Esq. Mayor.
