

COUNTRY NEWS.

7. 7.—Last Wednesday, in the Co. Court, Wm. Connell, and Andrew Coleman, stood two capital indictments, one on the White and the other on Lord Ellenborough's Act.— charged the prisoners with having on the night of April, fired at Peter Kelleher, in a village up. Of this act, evidence appeared exclusively Coleman, who was acquitted in a manner not confer much credit on his character.—The night it incumbent on him, therefore, to have been in prison under recognizance to be of the next year, himself in £100, and two sureties. The two Connells were acquitted on the charge for feloniously firing into Kelleher's house to murder him. The acquittal resulted from proof as to the intention, the witness having he could not say that the piece from which fired was loaded with any thing but powder. Carroll stood indicted for the wilful murder of a man, near Charleville—one Kirby, a witness against him, was ordered by the Court into custody, with directions to send examinations to the Court against him for that crime. Collins, it was alleged, had lost his life, but no evidence was adduced to prove it. The assault was proved against the prisoner, but there being only one indictment, and that he was of course acquitted. Higgins stood indicted for the murder of Corns, on the 1st Jan. last, at Green Hills, near Mallow. The prisoner had been tried for this offence, and from certain circumstances in the case was found guilty of manslaughter; the Court conceived that a similar verdict would be pronounced on this occasion, which was accordingly returned, and the prisoner sentenced to 3 months imprisonment. O'Connell, John Finn, and Wm. Walsh, stood indicted for a riot and affray near Liscarrol, in the month of July, 1807. They were all found guilty, under the charge of two men being killed in the riot. O'Connell, in the City Court, before the Hon. Judge Hart was tried, but acquitted on a new trial in favour of seamen in the navy, for persisting in a man who died making a will in favour of his sister. O'Connell, indicted for the wilful murder of a man, at the last Cork fair, was acquitted. O'Connell, aged about 14 years, was tried and convicted of stealing from the house of Mr. Daly, of a sum of money, notes to the amount of £370—Sentence was pronounced on him. On Saturday, Thomas McCarthy stood indicted in Court, for robbing the Roman Catholic Chapel, and despoiling the altar; but it being suggested to the Learned Judge that the prisoner was an idiot, His Lordship humanely remanded him, and directed the bills to be sent back to the Grand Jury to examine and reconsider them. The prisoner was brought before the Grand Jury yesterday, and made a full confession of the facts charged, but, evincing *non compos mentis*, he was ordered to be committed to the House of Correction, to prevent a repetition of the offence. On Sunday night last, a number of unfortunate people who have styled themselves reformers in spite of the awful lesson our last Assizes furnished, visited a number of farmers houses on the Wilton and Dunmore roads, in the vicinity of this City, and robbed a farmer of the name of Bryan, of a bag of powder.

Saturday last, at the Assizes for the County of Cork, came on to be tried before the Hon. Justice Day, a cause at *Nisi Prius*, wherein William Ryves, Esq. of Newgarden, in this Co. was plaintiff, and Messrs. Thomas and John Burke, and Thomas Stretch, were Defendants, respecting injury alleged to be sustained by Plaintiff, in the name of all the Proprietors of the Fisheries on the upper part of the River Shannon, by some obstructions made in the Salmon Weir of the City of Limerick, by the Defendants since the year 1805, when they became tenants to the Gentlemen who derive under the Corporation of the City of Limerick. The Plaintiff's case did not terminate until 12 o'clock on Saturday night, when the Court adjourned to Monday morning, and the Defence was then proceeded upon—the Jury at 7 o'clock that evening brought in a Verdict against the Tenants for £1000 Damages, and 6d Costs. The Volunteers from the Waterford militia, quartered in this City, commenced yesterday, and will continue (in consequence of their not completing their quota within the prescribed time) to the 24th inst. Colonel Vandeleur, of the 19th Light Dragoons, is appointed Assistant Adjutant General in this District, under Gen. Sir James Affleck, Bt. vice Major Colquhoun of the 88th Regt. who has proceeded to Portugal. Thursday last, the brig Herman, from Virginia, arrived at Cove, with flour, for orders. The 15th July, lat. 45. 12 N. long. 45. W. spoke the American ship Hannah, Capt. Robinson, for Philadelphia, which sailed from Cove 26th June—was boarded about 10 days after by a French brig privateer, from Guadaloupe, and plundered of 4 bales of linen and other articles, probably the same marauder that plundered the Swift, from the above port, for New Brunswick, about that time. Sunday last, His Majesty's ship Fortune, Capt. Vansittart, sailed from Cove on a cruise. Friday next, the Tramore Races commence.
