which had been ordered to cross the Rhine, have received orders to halt. It is reported that the Empress of Austria died on the 29th inst.

Wellesley is immediately to be created Viscount of Talavera, and of Wellington, Marquis of Wellesley, in the Co. Somerset. The King has in General Orders, issued on Friday the 29th inst. in the most gracious manner his thanks to the Duke of Wellington, Bart. K. B. and Lieut.-General Sir John Hope, and all the officers and men, for their brave achievement at Talavera. Sir John Hope commands the advance of the Army of Flanders; and to him is committed any operations which may be made, on the French force near Antwerp. It is now with the army what the Duke of Wellington was.

A report this morning, that the Armistice terminated on the Danube, but that an action was fought.

The liberality of the Danish Government has re-asserted itself in the rigour observed by the Committee of Norway. The following is an extract from a report by the master of a vessel just arrived from the East Indies:—“All ships carried in are condemned, as well as with cargoes—2 English, 3 Pappenburghian, 1 Oldenburgh, 33 Americans have been sent to the West Indies. Several Oldenburgh and Pappenburghian ships were loaded at Mandahl and got out, but were captured, and taken back again, and to be condemned.”

Reports with wounded officers and men of the 1st Regiment of Foot Guards, and several transports with French prisoners, arrived at Portsmouth from Portugal, after a very long voyage.

A Court of Directors was held at the East India House, when a number of Students for the East Indies were examined in Court, agreeably to a Statute in that behalf made by the General Court.

It is to be understood that in consequence of the unpleasant circumstances which have lately taken place in the First Regiment of Foot Guards, the whole of the remaining Captains (except Capt. Carroll) who were brought to a Court of Enquiry by their Lieut.-Col. Sir Charles Bamfylde, were acquitted.

Davidson, of the Royal Marines, convicted of stealing a watch, &c. from a shop in Taunton, is sentenced to transportation for 7 years.

The 1st Regiment, or Scotch brigade, now about to be sent to Aberdeen, are said to be under orders for the 1st of September.
