As their Graces were received by Sir Hugh and Lady Massey, and conducted by them along the water-works to the turret, where they graciously and repeatedly expressed their delight and admiration at the magnificence of the scene; then returning once more committed themselves to the canoes, and landing at Belmont, proceeded through a suite of elegant apartments to a Dejeune, entirely in character, with the landscape in magnificence, after which they repaired to Mount-Shannon.

The evening having been appointed for a ball, a numerous company assembled in the library and ball-room at 1 o'clock, and the ball was immediately opened by their Grace and Lady Isabella Fitzgibbon—a first appearance as interesting as it was youthful, and giving promise of an hereafter that will attract and charm the hearts of all.
