The high price of wool of every kind has attracted the attention of most of our breeders; they see the necessity of covering their Leicester sheep with fleeces of long, firm, combing wool; and the Leicester and South Down sheep having greatly benefited from the use of their clothing wool, wish to increase its value, and are preparing to try whether that object can be attained by a cross with the Merino, without injuring the carcass.
