

19.—At a Meeting of the Mayor, Sheriffs, Clergy, and principal Inhabitants of the City, held at the Mansion-House, on Monday, the 19th inst., 1809—to take into Consideration the mode of celebrating the approaching 25th Anniversary of the death of our Gracious and Beloved Sovereign, His Majesty King George the Third. The Meeting, after a long and unanimous deliberation, Resolved Unanimously—That it be the sense of the Meeting, that the most suitable mode of celebrating our Attachment to our beloved Sovereign, on the approaching Anniversary of his Majesty's death, shall be by a Solemn Service, and for that purpose a Subscription be opened—and that a Committee be appointed to receive Subscriptions.

The Committee have held a meeting, for the purpose of celebrating the commencement of the 50th Anniversary of His Majesty's Reign. On that occasion, it was Resolved Unanimously—that the day be celebrated with every mark of joy and festivity; that the inhabitants of the City assemble at the Court-House, on the 25th inst. to proceed from thence to St. Peter's Church; that the General and Officers of the Militia be invited to join with the Inhabitants in celebrating the Anniversary; that a Committee be directed to prepare a Bill of Illumination, and that there shall be a Ball at the Court-House on the evening of the 25th inst. Wednesday last, the transports Alexander and Union, arrived in Cork harbour, after a passage of 18 days from Lisbon, under convoy of his Majesty's sloop Dotterill, from which they parted on Tuesday last. Marshal Beresford sailed for England, on the same day as the convoy.

His Majesty's gun brig, Ferret, arrived at Ventry Harbour, near Dingle, on the 16th inst.

Early this morning the Right Worshipful Francis Lloyd, Esq. Mayor, visited the markets, and seized several carcasses of blown mutton, and three kishes of turf from forestallers, which his Worship sent to the House of Industry and Hospital for Lunatics.
