Mr. Hutchinson, one of the Representatives in Parliament, be requested to present the same to the House of Commons; and that Mr. Longfield, Esq. the other Representative in Parliament, be requested to present the same to the House of Commons; and that Mr. Conboy, the Representatives for the County of Cork, be requested to support the same.—That we do not readily co-operate with our Catholic Brethren in Dublin, and throughout the United Kingdom, in any effort to obtain a full participation of the rights of the Constitution; and that we will make respectful applications to the Legislature, to have obtained the just object of our solicitation, by essentially promote the union and happiness of the Country.—That we feel the warmest sympathy to our Fellow Subjects of different religions, who so wisely and liberally applauded our persevering efforts for the Restoration of our Constitutional Rights.—That four Gentlemen be appointed a committee, named at the last Meeting, and that they take all proper steps for preparing and presenting a Petition, and that a Subscription be entered into for the purpose of defraying the necessary ex-
