Some of the water seem extremely anxious to end without a struggle, and would have been not worth keeping. Very different is the opinion of its importance. The Minister at our having taken it; the anxiety he writes it as a conquest of little value, prove conviction is quite otherwise; that he feels the loss of the Scheldt, and disappoints all the boasts of making Antwerp one of the great ports of Europe, both for the purposes of arms of war, and of commerce in times of peace.

Some time ago delivered to the Admiralty the plan of the Scheldt against any attack of the enemy's force comparatively small, but the plan, we trust, will be executed. Whatever Bonaparte does to the island, we may be sure he will do during the war, we shall see what will offer in any negotiation for peace for us arrived from Heligoland, with intelligence to the 22d, and from that island to the 23d. It seems, from these communications, had not then signified his assent to the peace between Francis and Napoleon; and it further that the four first propositions made by Bonaparte were rejected with disdain by his unfortunate successor, tending to annihilate his power and to destroy his empire. Hood sailed from Portsmouth yesterday in the Centaur, of 74 guns, accompanied by the 74, Hon. Capt. Blackwood, for the Mediterranean. Some persons suppose that Sir Samuel is to command a squadron of 10 sail of the line, destined to cruise in the Indian navy, trade, and settlements in the East. If such a design is entertained, certainly Sir Samuel could be selected to execute it. It is expected, that he is destined merely to succeed the junior Admirals on the Mediterranean.

It is said that Mr. Richard Wharton, Chairman of the Committee of Ways & Means in the House of Commons, is to succeed Mr. Huskisson in the office of Secretary to the Treasury for the present.

Mr. Wharton was the oldest officer present at the Levee on Wednesday, and was the first presented to the King. The Levee was one of the grandest that has been for a number of years. There were supposed to be between 3 & 400 persons present. It has not been filled since the first Levee after His Majesty's return from his indisposition.

The King, on the Jubilee, sent a handsome letter to the Relief of Persons confined for small pox. His Majesty had graciously given orders

Wednesday next. Saturday arrived in Cork harbour, the Pit, Transport, Captain Bruce, part of a convoy from Lisbon, having on board the head-quarters of the 1st Division of detachments, formed from the army of the late Lieut. Gen. Sir John Moore, and commanded by Col. Bussbury, of the Buffs. The remains of this gallant battalion, which so eminently distinguished itself at the taking of Oporto, and the late glorious battle of Talavera, and which was so honorably noticed by Lord Wellington, in his orders and dispatches, are now about to join their respective regiments, all of which are in England. The rest of the fleet have arrived at Scilly.

The West India fleet, 30 in number, sailed from Cove on Saturday evening, under convoy of the Rainbow frigate, and the Reindeer sloop of war. They cleared the harbour before night; but as wind had been since light, and not very favorable, they cannot yet have proceeded any considerable distance from the coast. Major-General Lord Clarina and suite, and Lady Clarina took their passage in the Concord, merchantman, for his Lordship's command in the West Indies. Captain Westropp has gone out as his Lordship's Aid-de-Camp.

The British sloop of war sailed on Sunday from Cove for England, having Admiral Whitshed on board, and a convoy in charge bound to the ports in the Channel. The naval command at the port of Cork has, in consequence of Admiral Whitshed's departure, devolved upon Captain Bruce, of the Virginia frigate.

The Fortune frigate, Capt. Vansittart, sailed on Monday last from Cove, on a cruise.

The 26th, 28th, 31st, 11th, 51st and 79th are ordered to proceed to Walcheren immediately.

Monday last, 20 recruits for the North Mayo Militia, arrived in town from that County, and continued their route for head-quarters at Rathkeale.
