all the route of the military, the streets are crowded
 and all possibility of description—the Shops are
 up, and the most dreadful alarm prevails—GOD
 that the tumult may speedily subside, which we
 trust it will, now that the Dragoons have retired. All
 the windows of the Tower are covered with military.

Three o'Clock.—The town still continues in a state of
 alarm. The people are now quitting the East and
 moving towards the West end of the town. Numerous
 persons, however, are moving about Tower-hill in vari-
 ous directions, and loud in their expressions of disap-
 pointment. Every embrasure in the Tower has a gun
 mounted in it, and the Artillery-men are seen on the
 battlements with their port fires. Whenever an Officer
 appears at any of the port-holes, he is saluted with cries
 of "BURDETT for ever." A strong guard of the Vet-
 erans stands immediately within the palisade gate,
 the side of the ditch. Several of the wounded have been
 conveyed into different houses on Tower-hill and others
 have been received into the Hospitals.

We stop the Press to announce, with extreme sorrow,
 in consequence of the attack made by the mob upon
 Tower-hill, and in the vicinity, on the Military, with
 stones, &c. &c. the latter was provoked to fire,
 and many persons have in consequence fallen victims on
 this melancholy occasion. The rumours are so various
 respecting this unhappy affair, that it is impossible to col-
 lect any authentic particulars at this moment, but all ac-
 counts concur in stating the violence of the mob, and the
 appearance of the military, till matters began to assume
 the aspect of a very formidable riotous spirit.

Gravesend, April 8.—The 3d regt. passed thro'
 the town between six and seven this morning—since
 which part of the 95th (rifle corps) and another regiment
 have passed towards you, which I hope and trust will
 secure the metropolis from the disturbances with which
 it is threatened.

Dover, April 8.—The Perth and Buckinghamshire
 regiments of Militia have marched off from the Castle
 heights with all speed for Canterbury, from whence
 the regular troops there, are, it is said, proceeding to
 London.

The 15th Dragoons was commanded by Lieut. Col.
 Grant. Captain Cochrane, the brother of Lord Cochran,
 belongs to it.

For several days past, troops have been drawing
 towards the metropolis, from Kent, Sussex, and Essex.
 The number of troops which arrived in the Metropo-
 lis and its immediate vicinity, in the course of yesterday
 estimated at 10,000. The drums beat to arms at
 daylight, yesterday, and the S. Glo'ster Militia, were
 immediately assembled, & proceeded on a forced march
 to London. The 51st Regt. received route, & march-
 ed at 12 a Saturday night, from Horsham for London.
 Private letters from Prussia, quoted in the German
 Journals, mention that the King of Prussia intends very
 shortly to make a journey to Paris, accompanied by the
 Emperor of Russia. Neither the precise time of their
 departure, the road they will take, nor the object of
 their journey, are stated. It is supposed that the Queen
 of Prussia will follow the two Sovereigns.

The E. India Fleet which was to have been dispatched
 yesterday, will not be dispatched till after Tuesday next.

The Thais sloop, on her passage home spoke His
 Majesty's sloop *Care*, Capt. Byng, off the Island of Ber-
 muda, who informed her, that two days before, he fell
 in with a vessel from that Island, who told him that the
 Thistle schooner of 6 guns, had fallen in with and cap-
 tured after an action of six hours, a Batavian East India-
 man, worth 400,000 dollars. She proved to be a ship
 from Batavia, bound to America, having on board Ad-
 miral Hartsink, (who was wounded) with his property.

A report has reached Yarmouth that Sandy Island,
 near Heligoland is taken by the French, and all the En-
 glish property taken. It is not believed at the Admiralty.

Extract of a letter from Captain Patton, of the ship
Henry Morris, dated Montserrat, 26th Feb. to Messrs.
 Williams and Wilson at Liverpool:—"The *Eleanor*,
 from London, arrived November the 25th, and brought
 the unpleasant intelligence, that the greater part of the
 Cork Fleet had been destroyed by the enemy."

Mr. Ely, an American gentleman, landed at Dover on
 Sunday morning, charged with dispatches from General
 Armstrong, at Paris, to Mr. Pinckney, the American
 Minister in London.

The applicants for a new Theatre being refused a
 Charter by the Lords in Council, have presented a Peti-
 tion to the King for a Patent.

In the House of Commons, on Wednesday, the Irish
 School Bill was passed, and ordered to the Lords.

The House resolved into Committee on the Judges
 Salaries Act.

Admiral Harvey was restored to his rank by means of
 a Memorial to the King, who referred the same to the
 Admiralty. The answer was signed by all the Lords in
 favor of Admiral Harvey's restoration.

The Danish papers mention, that in consequence of
 the difficulty of a direct intercourse with this country, it
 was probable that Wisb, a town in Gothland, (13 miles
 S. E. of Stockholm,) would become the rallying point
 of the British and Russian trade, and receive the same
 liberties and commercial privileges as Gottenburgh.
