The Fermanagh Regiment, quartered at Castlebar, re-
ceived a route on Monday, and marched on Thursday
to do duty in Cashel; they are replaced by the 2d bat.
92d Regt. from Cavan and Belturbet—the 92d, are re-
placed by the 21st regt. from Enniskillen.

The 3d Garrison Bat. have proceeded from Cove to
Bantry, to relieve 1st G. B. who are to do duty in Coye.

An American vessel arrived at Cove on Wednesday
night from Pondacot, in the United States, after a
passage of 33 days: nothing was known when she sail-
ed of the Non-intercourse Act being repealed. On the
11th inst. in lat. 47. 45. North, long. 20. 56. she was
boarded by a French brig privateer, called the Grand
Napoleon, who put on board her the master and crew
of the Fox packet, from the Brazils, bound to Gree-
nock, with a cargo of cotton, tallow, &c.—On the 17th
inst. in lat. 51. 15. about 25 leagues to the westward of
Cape Clear, again saw the above French privateer.—
Previous to the above capture, she took two English
vessels, one of which was an armed ship from South
America, the Captain of which threw his guns over-
board in the chase.

The Commodore at Cork fired a gun on Thursday,
for the West India fleet to unmoor.

The entire of Wednesday last was occupied by a hear-
ing, the most patient and impartial we have ever wit-
nessed, before the Rt. Worshipful Francis Lloyd, Esq.
Mayor, and Sir Richard Harte, one of the Charter Jus-
tices; and, as it concerns not only all masters and em-
ployers of every description, but the working classes of
the community in this and every other part of Ireland, we
think it a duty we owe the Public, to state the circum-
stances. James Moynihan, Patrick Nail, Pat. Kelly,
Dan. Reidy, and John Donnellan, labourers, employed
at the Distillery of Messrs. Stein, Brown & Co. in this
City, were charged with having, in furtherance of a
Combination to obtain an advance of wages, absented
themselves without reasonable cause from the service of
their employers, within the accustomed hours of working

—It appeared that those persons, and about twenty
others, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon of Saturday last,
quitted the Concern in a body; and it was proved, by
the testimony of four respectable witnesses, that their
departure was not only without permission, but that
considerable detriment and inconvenience occurred to
the particular process in which they had been engaged.

A defence was ingeniously attempted, but evidence
being offered in support of the prisoners, it appeared that
the persons who were brought forward for that purpose,
were all concerned in quitting the work, and of course
their testimony was inadmissible; and it being proved
that they were of the party, they were committed to
Jail to abide their trials for the like offence—their names
are Mich. Fahy, Mich. Rice, J. Callinan & J. Boalman.

The Justices, after a short deliberation, pronounced
the sentence of the Law on the five persons who were
tried, which is, that they be each imprisoned Six Months
in the Common Jail, under the Act of the 43d of the
King, Chap. 86, entitled "An Act to prevent unlaw-
ful Combinations of Workmen, Artificers, Journeymen
and Labourers in Ireland, &c."

On Thursday the Right Worshipful Francis Lloyd,
Esq. Mayor, as Coroner, held an Inquest on the body
of Stephen Conner, a workman in the employment of
Messrs. Stein, Brown & Co. Distillers, who fell, early
on that morning, into a pan of scalding water—Verdict,
"that he came to his death by accidentally falling into
a Copper, containing hot wort, at the Distillery, whereby
he was scalded and burned, and of such scalding and
burning died."

A woman of the name of Vaughan, was on Thursday
last tossed into the air, by a bullock running furiously
over Thomond Bridge:—the unfortunate woman died
in a few minutes. An Inquest was held yesterday by
the Mayor, and a Verdict returned of "Accidental
Death."
