The object of his visit is supposed to be, to de- mand an explanation of the recent and numerous con- demnations of American vessels by the Danish Govt.

The 1st, or Royal Dragoon Guards, are under orders to embark at Portpatrick for this Country. The 16th and 60th Regts. quartered at Surinam, were by the last accounts, greatly reduced by sickness and death. The 16th were under orders to embark for England. Jamaica is, & has been in a very sickly state. Letters from the island of Zante, dated the 17th March, state, that on the following day an Expedition, consisting of 2900 men, under Gen. Oswald, was to sail from that island, supposed for Corfu. Major Clarke & Capt. Church, both natives of Cork, were to go on it. Tuesday, the 2d Gar. Bat. commanded by Sir Edw. Ryan, was reviewed in Drogheda, by Gen. Beresford. The City Cork Militia, quartered in Enniscorthy, have given 66 spirited fellows to the 67th & 102d regts. The validity of the late Lord Bellew's Will, is to be investigated this Term in the Irish Court of Chancery, on which depends the inheritance of estates and prop- erty to the amount of £150,000. It is said that Doctor Hargrove, of this City, is about laying claim to an English Baronetcy, which has been dormant upwards of 50 years. Thursday night, about 11 o'clock, a fire was discov- ered in the stores of Mr. Kennedy Ryan, at Carr- street, in this City, which raged so furiously that, not- withstanding the prompt assistance of the inhabitants, and the military of the garrison, it baffled all their ex- ertions to subdue the flames, although the different parish engines, and that of the Ordnance stores, were well attended, to endeavour to prevent the conflagration.— The fire continued till two o'clock in the morning, when nearly the entire of the premises & stock were consumed.
