King's Bench—Boyle, v. McLoughlin.
An action of slander, brought by Philip Llyshenion, against the Right Rev. Peter Talaric Bishop of the diocese of Raphoe, at assizes of Lifford, in the county of Donegal, on the 21st of March, 1803, before the Hon. Circuit and a Special Jury, to recover damages, for having excommunicated the plaintiff, thereby deprived him of the society of the Catholic Religion.

In this action, the Jury found a verdict for the plaintiff, £50. In the ensuing term, Counsel, for the defendant, moved an arrest of judgment, which was argued with great ability on both sides, and on Friday last, the Court of King's Bench gave the subject the most moderate provincial judgment for the plaintiff.

Limerick, May 30.

The Mayor and Deputy Governors, of the Co. of Limerick, at their General Meeting held in the city, on Saturday last, resolved in pursuance of a Motion of his Grace the Lord Lieutenant, by Ballot, for raising the deficiencies of the City Regt. of Militia:—in consequence of Liberties, &c. were forwarded subscriptions, amounts fixed, and Right Constables, & other assistants, for the purpose of preparing the Lists, according to the provisions of the Act.

The Co. Dublin Militia, arrived on Thursday evening, near Ballyugh, from Ardfinnan, and will also arrive there, both to do duty until next week.

Nothing is to change to take place in the army corps during the present year:—The 2d Guards will march this week, at Dunglougher Barracks, and proceed to take the quarters of English 1st Dragoons, stationed at Donaghmore.—The 8th, will then march to Donaghmore, with 1st Dragoons, who proceed immediately south. The 2d, or Greys, quartered in Dublin, in the course of a few days, for England, will be replaced there, by the 7th Light Dragoons, whose march to Liverpool, for this country, is to a new regulation in the army, issued by Majesty, soldiers allowed to leave the service, on discharge, may now pay the levy of two recruits, instead of being compelled to enlistees as formerly.
