

all those situate and being at the left of the Thalweg, shall belong to his Russian Majesty, and those at the right to his Austrian Majesty.

3. The navigation of the Danister shall be free as heretofore, but such freedom shall not prevent the reciprocal regulations of the custom-houses established.—The relative orders for the passage of the respective subjects of Russia and Austria will hold their vigour, except in the cases hereafter mentioned.

4. Every inhabitant of a city, town, village, or hamlet, situate upon either bank of the river, throughout its whole extent as it serves to limit the two Empires, if he possesses upon the opposite side any property whatsoever, depending upon the territory of that city, town, village or hamlet, will be bound to dispose of it within the time to be fixed by the two Imperial Courts, and which shall be promulgated by a formal decision of the respective Governments, that no one may plead ignorance, inasmuch as after the expiration of the terms appointed, it will be allowed to no individual to pass from one side to the other to feed his cattle, or cultivate any lands there situate and undisposed of.

5. As that part of the circle of Tarnopol, verging on that of Ziocrow, towards the Lordship of Zalosere, is in the total want of wood, it will be allowed to the inhabitants of the circle, as well as those of the parts ceded of the circles of Ziocrow, and of Brzegan, to purchase and to export freely from the fortress of Zalozze, their wood and timber.

6. Territorial titles, archives and maps of the countries ceded, will be given up within the space of two months, to be dated from the exchange of the ratifications of the present treaty. At Leopold, the 11—22d March.

BENCOOLEN TAKEN AND PLUNDERED.

We (Correspondent) have just received information, that intelligence has been received at the India House, that Bencoolen has been taken and plundered by the crews of two French frigates, and that all the shipping in the harbour have been burnt, or otherwise destroyed.

The frigates are probably the Venus and La Manche, which captured the United Kingdom, and Chariton, East Indiaman, as stated in the American Papers.

Bencoolen, of which, an account of its capture by the French, appears under our Dublin news, is a fort and town on the S. W. coast of the Island of Sumatra, in the Pacific Ocean, and belongs to the English.—The country about Bencoolen is mountainous & woody; several volcanoes in the island; the air is unwholesome, and the mountains are continually covered with thick heavy clouds, which produce lightning, thunder, and rain. The natives are swarthy, slender, and straight; desirous of trade, but treacherous and revengeful—there are a few smiths amongst them, but most of them are carpenters, and fishermen. All provisions, except fruit are scarce; there is no beef to be had except that of buffaloes which is not very palatable.—The chief trade is in pepper. Lon. 102. 5 E. lat. 5. 49. S.

The 7th Light Dragoons (Lord Paget's) have arrived in Dublin from Liverpool.—They are splendidly dressed as Hussars. The 6th dragoons have also arrived there.

The Races of Lemonfield, near this City, commence to-morrow; very great sport is expected.
