the limiting or Chenat of this river; that is to say; all those situate and being at the left of the Thalweg, shall belong to his Russian Majesty, and those at the right to his Austrian Majesty.

I The navigution of the Delester shall be free as leretofore, but such freedom shall not prevent the reci-

proval regulations of the custom-houses established .-The relative orders for the passage of the respective subects of Russia and Ametria will hold their vigour, except

in the cases hereafter mentioned.

4. Every inhabitant of a city, town, village, or ham-

let, situate upon either bank of the river, throughout its whole extent as it serves to limit the two Empires, if he possesses upon the opposite side any property whatsoever, depending upon the territory of that city, town, village or hamlet, will be hound to dispose of it within the time to be fixed by the two Imperial Courts, and which shall be promulgated by a formal decision of the respective Governments, that no one may plead ignorance, in somuch as after the expiration of the terms appointed, it will be allowed to no individual to pass from one side to the other to feed his cattle, or cultivate any lands there situate and undisposed of.

5. As that part of the circle of Tarnopol, verging on that of Ziocrow, towards the Iordship of Zalosere, is in the total want of wood, It will be allowed to the inhabitants of the circle, as well as those of the parts ceded of the circles of Ziocrow, and of Brzegan, to purchase and to export freely from the fortress of Zalozeze, their wood and timber. 6. Territorial titles, archieves and maps of the coun-

tries ceded, will be given up within the space of two months, to bedated from the exchange of the ratifications of the present treaty. At Leopold, the 11-22d March.

BENCOOLEN TAKEN AND PLUNDERED.

We (Correspondent) have just received information, that intelligence has been received at the India House, that Bencoolen has been taken and plundered by the crews of two French frigates, and that all the shipping in the harbour have been burnt, or otherwise destroyed.

The frigates are probably the Venus and La Manche, which captured the United Kingdom, and Charkon, East Indiamen, as stated in the American Papers.
