Riell. A Message was sent to the Council, transmitting the said draft, and saying, the House had received and approved of the same."

Boston Papers to the 24th ult. arrived in Cork on Monday. They are a day later than those acknowledged in London, and are important in one fact namely, a dissension in the American Cabinet. Mr. Smith, and the Secretary of the Treasury, Mr. Gallatin, have had a political disagreement, and divided the American Councils; but they have gone no further. When matters proceeded beyond reconciliation with the American Ministers, the President's decision disposed of the misunderstanding, and for that time both parties were governed by it. The President's opinion favoured Mr. Gallatin's policy, which is represented as rather partial to England. Smith on the other hand, is said to promote French interests, and as his party is represented to be stronger than that of his adversary, it was supposed that ultimately he would prevail against him. The spirit of faction and partizanship was undiminished when the last accounts left Washington.

It was rumoured in America that Mr. Jackson would be recalled to the seat of Government.

Extract of a letter from Capt. Wren, of the 11th regiment of foot, dated Faya (Portugal) 24th May, 1810 to his Mother, in this City:—"Our Army is well supplied with every comfort; the enemy are the reverse—badly fed and clothed; deserters are daily coming in, from their lines."—The above must afford a high gratification to our numerous Readers, many of whom have near relations in the British Army, and whilst we anticipate the probability of a victory, they have every comfort the place can possibly afford.

The South Cork Regt. which has been stationed in Tralee and the Co. Kerry, for upwards of 14 months, have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to march, it is said for Belfast.

Friday last, William Worrall, Gent. of this City, was admitted one of the Attornies of His Majesty's Courts of Exchequer and Common Pleas.

Sunday morning, Catherine Collins, otherwise Farrell, of Newcastle, in the Liberties of this City, who had been missing since that day se'night, was discovered floating on the River Shannon, above the head of the Canal:—the Right Worshipful Francis Lloyd, Esq. Mayor, had, yesterday se'night, examined several witnesses respecting the woman's non-appearance, & a man named John Lillis, of Six-mile-bridge, Co. Clare, who had been in her company on Sunday evening, was held to bail; but on Sunday afternoon, his Worship, as Coroner, held an inquest on the body, when, after the most minute investigation, the Jury could only come to the following decision:—"We find that the said Catherine Collins was drowned in the River Shannon, near Rhebogue, on the 17th day of June inst. but in what manner we are not informed."

About three o'clock in the afternoon of Sunday, a boy named John Keating, aged about ten years, bathing near the Bridge at the Abbey River unfortunately sunk, and notwithstanding search being instantly made, the body was not found for nearly three quarters of an hour, when it was conveyed to the Co. Infirmary, and altho' every exertion which could be made by professional abilities was used, the vital spark was flown, and the lifeless corps was thus consigned an early victim for the Grave.—An Inquest was yesterday holden by the Mayor and Sir Richard Harte, two County Magistrates, on the body and a verdict of "accidental death," was of course instantly returned.

On Monday, the Right Worshipful May Clamp of Turf intended for forestalling, was ordered to the House of Industry.

Thirty loaves bread, light and indifferent, seized by the present active Market Jury, were on Tuesday to the poor Widows in the Alms-house.
