

Joseph Gash, an aged Huntsman, well known to the Gentlemen of this County, was on Sunday morning last found murdered on the Ground at Lemonfield;—the perpetrator unknown, suspicion not attaching to any one, and the man was considered very innocent, until a verdict of wilful murder has been returned by the Jury at the Coroner's Inquest.

An Inquest was held on the body of the deceased, at Millford, near Milltown-Claire, before Michael D'Alton, Esq. a Justice of the Peace for that County, and Andrew Perry, Esq. a Justice of the Peace, when the Jury returned a verdict against Catherine Farrell, otherwise known as the 'Black Girl', who has absconded. The deceased has left a family of six children in the greatest distress.

At 10 o'clock, on Sunday morning, two family carriages, and Allen's, collected to the amount of £100, near Long's more, for the purpose of disputing, and notwithstanding the activity of the High Constables of this City, proposed, by which one man who has lodged indignantly, and were it not for the interference of the above Peace Officer, and the military things would have been serious. On the same night, the house of Maurice Grant, was also set on fire; but by timely assistance, it was fortunately got under without injury.

Accident by Fire!—Thursday night last, at the house of Mr. Martin Fahey, in the parish of Castleblaney, County Monaghan, was discovered a fire. It is supposed to have commenced at the time of its discovery, the whole of the house was in a universal blaze. Every possible exertion was made by the inhabitants, but alas! in vain, to save the family, seven of whom were consumed, and one having escaped but Mr. Fahey himself and night-servant. Among the sufferers were his wife, two children, two servant maids, and two of the 1st Dragoon Guards. The whole of the property, which was considerable, was consumed, and has left him, who was the day before in comfortable circumstances, literally a beggar. The house of Mr. Sadleir, at Riverstown, Dublin, was also consumed by fire on Thursday night.
