**Murder!**—About midnight, on Sunday last, a num-  
ber of villains, went to the house of Tim. Collins, at  
Balligarron, a village about five miles from Waterford.  
On demanding admittance, Collins opened the door,  
and was instantly shot through the heart!—the ruffians  
then fired at his two brothers, who had escaped from  
the house, both of whom they wounded, one it is feared  
mortally, the other it is hoped will recover. They then  
set fire to the cabin, after locking the door, and dread-  
ful to relate, a fine young woman perished in the flames.  
The family were all asleep on the arrival of the assassins,  
and from the darkness and confusion attending the sur-  
prise, the survivors can furnish no clue to a discovery of  
the murderers.—Collins was originally from the Co. of  
Cork or Kerry, but has been in the Co. of Waterford  
above 20 years, and it is understood has resided for  
some time on the Lands of Balligarron. He received  
notice lately, to quit his farm—and his non-compliance,  
it is supposed, has occasioned the horrible catastrophe.

A riot took place, at the fair of Broadford, Co. Clare,
