Information has been filed by the Attorney-General, against two leading City Orators. The Courts, by a recent Act of Parliament, are to transport for life, persons convicted of crimes.

Provincial Theatres of England have been lately successful; and this declining influence of dramatic representation has been, whether truly or not, we are inclined to impute to the general prevalence of methodical doctrines throughout the kingdom. At Hull, in an advocate for those doctrines, tells his country Sunday, that there is no possibility that could be saved, or any body who frequents the same notions are inculcated by a Member at Birmingham, and at other places, congregations are in general very numerous. The same paragraph could not possibly pass a sermon (though not intentionally) on the pulpit; and we hope will be attended to by the Minister.

An irregular circumstance, and reflects great honor on the City of Birmingham, that during the greater part of the week, the doors of the prison were left open, admitting a single prisoner therein.

DUBLIN, JULY 5.

A considerable fleet of East Indiamen which left St. Helena on the 1st of May last, have made the English coast. They were accompanied from the Point de Gatte by the *And* and *Penang* frigates. — *Correspondents.*

Derry is bankrupt in that Kingdom."

It is understood that his Lordship, a man so universally respected, has given directions to the Editors of those papers for this libel. — D. C. has sent for the principal Manufacturers of the City, to consult with them on the best method to counteract the general effects of the present depression of the metropolis, and to revive the little trade which had remained in Dublin since the late measure, it is reported, took its rise from the appearance which was made yesterday in the Liberty of some thousands of persons in want of employment. — *D. On the night last, a fire was discovered in the Rokeby-hall, House, the residence of Lord Rokeby, and before it could be got under, a great part of the building and the furniture were destroyed. On the appearance of the fire, a servant rode into town for fire engines, and Messrs. Armstrong and Armstrong, of the City, procured horses with which they proceeded with the engines to the place, and with every assistance in their power to extinguish the fire, and to preserve the mansion. — *Drog. "And be it further enacted, That in all cases where any new line of road shall have been surveyed, approved of, and presented by any Grand Jury and Court at any Assizes, whereby any Mail Coach Road now in use, or any part of such road shall be proposed to be avoided; it shall be lawful for the Grand Jury and the Court to allow any affidavit for accounting for the temporary repair of the part of such Mail Coach Road as is so to be avoided, although it shall not be specially stated in any such affidavit "that there is not on either side of any part of the road specified in such affidavit, any Grip, trench, or drain without a wall or other sufficient fence between such Grip, Trench or Drain, and the side of such road;" any thing in the said recited Act of the last Session of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding.

Yesterday, the Right Worshipful Francis Lloyd, Esq. Mayor, as Coroner, held an Inquest at the New Barracks, on the body of Corporal William Bridges, of the Waterford Regiment of Militia quartered in this city, who on the night of Saturday last, was wantonly attacked by two of the watchmen of St. Michael's Parish, and received such a stroke on his head, inflicted with the mounted Pole of one of those nightly guardians, that it proved mortal, and by which he expired on Thursday evening. — After hearing the testimony of many witnesses, and the most patient investigation of the circumstances; the Jury returned the following Verdict "We find that the said Wm. Bridges was wilfully murdered by James Devitt, a watchman of St. Michael's Parish, by his the said James Devitt, on the night of the 30th of June last, in said Parish wilfully striking the said William Bridges a violent blow with a Pole on the left side of the head, causing a mortal contusion thereon, of which mortal contusion he instantly languished, and died at the new Barracks, in the suburbs of said City, on the 5th day of July instant. And We further find that Robert Maguire, another watchman of said Parish, was in company with the said James Devitt at the time of his giving the said blow."

The activity of the Right Worshipful Mayor has caused the apprehension of the above mentioned James Devitt and Robert Maguire.

The Mayor after the termination of the above business proceeded to Dooradoyle, in the South Liberties of this City, and held an inquest on the body of John Johnson, (one of the Kerby faction,) mentioned in our paper of Wednesday se'night, as being concerned in the pitched battle on the Sunday previous; — this unfortunate hero who was one of the champions fixed on to determine the fate of the day, received such a beating, that he expired on last Thursday night; — and the Jury brought the following Verdict: "We find that the said John Johnson came to his death on the night of the 5th of July inst. at Dooradoyle, in the Liberties of said City, by means of several bruises on his back and body, and a violent battering received by him at Ballykeeffe, in said Liberties on the 24th day of June last, from many persons to us unknown."

Cornelius O'Brien, Esq. who stands charged with the murder of Francis Drew, of Scariff, Co. Cliffe, Esq. has given notice that he will in due time surrender himself to the High Sheriff of the Co. of Meath, to abide his trial at the next assizes of that Co. to be held at Trim.

Sir Richard Harte, as a County Limerick Magistrate, detected a woman on Thursday last tendering a forged Certificate, to be signed by him, in order to enable him to obtain the Family allowance for herself and two children: — Sir Richard instantly observed the intended fraud, and the woman confessed that she obtained it from a person who prepared it for her, and forged the names of Colonel the Right Hon. Lord Muskery, and of Adjutant Connor, both of the Co. Regt.; and she has sworn information to that effect. This is inserted for the purpose of inducing Magistrates to be very circumspect when such Certificates are offered for signature; and also to warn those who are guilty of such criminal practices, productive of such glaring imposition on the Revenue of the Country.
