Information of our numerous Readers, we have the following remarks respecting the Road Acts: 9th of the King, Chap. 84, no Affidavit to be taken for the Repairs of any Road shall be allowed, unless it is stated in the Affidavit that there is not an inch of any part of such Road any grip, trench, or drain, without a wall or other sufficient defence being made.

Act of the 30th of the King, Chap. 29, states: "Whereas in many parts of Ireland the want of such walls or other sufficient fences may be a great hindrance to the improvement of the same, with great expence; he it therefore enacted by His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, in this present Parliament assembled, and in the 10th of the same, that it shall and may be the duty of the Grand Jury and the Court, at any Assizes or Sessions to be hold in Ireland, to allow any person to make a Road on which His Majesty's Mails are carried (by two or more horses), without its being stated in the Affidavit by the said Act, that "there is not an inch of any part of such Road any grip, trench, or drain without a wall or other sufficient defence being made."

It appears that no former Grand Jury ever made an Affidavit for making such wall or fence; any thing done in violation of the contrary notwithstanding, it is further enacted, That in all cases where any part of a road shall have been surveyed, approved, or consented to by any Grand Jury and Court at any time, and hereby any Mail Coach Road now in use, or any other such road shall be proposed to be avoided; it is lawful for the Grand Jury and the Court to make an Affidavit for accounting for the temporary repairs of such Mail Coach Road as is so to be made, although it shall not be specially stated in any
