

of affairs in France, on the departure of this much the same, as far as it relates to the commerce, as before; the American Minister, rely upon the measures taken for the sequestration of American vessels, presented a strong and representation on the injustice and impolicy of this measure. No answer had been received from the Government at the expiration of five weeks. Whether an answer was subsequently received or not, is uncertain. It is possibly the dispatches now received may contain some advices on the subject; some persons appear to be sanguine on a prospect of accommodation, because Gen. Armstrong has not arrived; but this amounts to nothing, because it is certain that the Gen. had determined to return home under whatever circumstances, and in whatever manner he might think proper to stand.

Following is another account given of the arrival of the John Adams, which vessel it was supposed would bring some conclusive dispatches.

**More, June 13.**—The John Adams has arrived at New York, and come to anchor near the fort, yesterday morning, 48 days from Havre, Capt. Evans was ashore to receive the Commodore, and proceeded to Washington with dispatches from Gen. Armstrong. We believe those who are fond of foreign lotteries for prizes, are disappointed, in seeing no change for the better in our affairs, either in England or France. **HOW COULD WE EXPECT IT?** It is through federal stratagem and energy, aided by the notable imbecility of pretended democrats in our country is disgraced, and its citizens subjected to heavy losses. To-morrow, or next day, perhaps, we shall learn the particular nature of the dispatches received by this vessel.

**Philadelphia, June 15.**—It is generally believed, and it is probable to the executive, that Mr. Pinkney has been recalled from the embassy at London. We are far from suspecting Mr. Pinkney of any corrupt or criminal designs, but either his mind has been impaired by *bad company*, or the infirmity of his nature has rendered him not all qualified to represent a country that has been so cruelly and indignominously treated, and that has been the court of the oppressor. The vilest vakeel of an Asiatic prince would not, in the midst of rhetorical hyperbole, impeach a Government of virtues which he has felt, nor talk of its *good faith* in return for *bastinado* received.

On the 19th of June, Major Dennis Hogan, formerly a Major in the British army, died in Philadelphia;—a paragraph published in a paper there, is at considerable length, and goes to say, that this person (whom our readers will recollect presumed to charge his Royal Highness the Duke of York with several corrupt military practices,) died suddenly, and seems to imply, that the cause of his death was supposed to be either from a fever or from hardships, which he experienced since he came to the American States. After leaving Great Britain, he resided for some time in the capacity of a planter in the West Indies, from thence he went to Washington and other parts of that Continent, and only arrived at Philadelphia a few days immediately previous to his decease.
