

depending between Sir William Corporation of Dublin, was on the 1st of July in the Court of Sir William with costs. The concerns of Mr. Sinnett, in the Liberty, were almost entirely together with a valuable property, and the whole of the machinery, been occasioned by the carelessness employed by Mr. Sinnett. Importance with regard to the validity of gambling debts, was on Monday in the Court of Exchequer. It appeared that the defendant had obtained a bond, passed in the name of a great magistrate (Doctor's) demise, fell into the hands of the defendant. The principal and interest, the Marquis rejected the application on Monday before the Chief Justice, notwithstanding a bond in the amount, the transaction which was found to be deficient in legal validity, and the Court refused to give judgment. The Jury, of course, followed the Judge as to the law, and returned a verdict for the Marquis, with 6d. costs. On a second trial, the defendant, obtaining, under false pretences, a sum of one hundred pounds, the prosecution was continued for four days. The Court, with the concurrence of Sir William, decided in favor of the Crown, and the defendant was sentenced to seven years—D. E. P.

On a third trial, the defendant, on part of the lady, moved for a writ of Habeas Corpus, and was sent up to the Grand Jury forthwith. The defendant opposed this—he said the lady was not to be ready at such a short notice. The Court, undecided yet, whether she would be ready, or in the event she was apprehended, or in the event her marriage was alleged to have been dissolved. The motion was refused, and the defendant was committed to the House of Correction.

**VERSUS Sir Thomas Fitzgerald, Bt.**  
 Instituted in the Court of Chancery by the Creditors of the late William A. Fitzgerald (known as Buck English) to set aside certain mortgages of the lands of Emly, in the county of Tipperary, alleged to have been fraudulently obtained from Mr. English by Sir Thomas Fitzgerald, Bt. On a former hearing set aside the mortgages, and restored the possession of the lands to the creditors:—Sir Thomas, however, set up a claim of an old judgment debt due to him by one Crozier against Mr. English, and this claim, with a view to the discharge of the mortgages, was set aside by the Court. The creditors resisted this claim, alleging that the debt was not established, and that nothing was ever due to Sir Thomas by Crozier, or by Sir Thomas to Crozier. A long and minute discussion this day took place, and the consideration of all the facts of the case was of opinion that Sir Thomas's claim was not established, and he therefore was ordered to pay the costs.—This cause has lasted nearly
