Francis Lloyd, where every degree of friendly and professional attention was evinced; and with the advice of a skillful surgeon, we understand, Mr. Massy is now in a way of recovery.

Adjournment of the City Sessions, on Monday morning Mr. Kneen, and Mary Walsh, were convicted by the Worshipful Recorder, of having assaulted and defamed two respectable females—a crime, which has become too frequent in this populous City. The culprits were immediately ordered to prison; in consequence of the good character of the youngest daughter, and the Recorder wisely judging that she would not come out better by being in company with her associate, had her liberated; and it is hoped, that the example he gave the crowd of females in the Court, will prevent a repetition of insults being offered by them, to the daughters or sisters of our fellow-citizens.

Sentence on Mary M'Knee has not been yet pronounced. Right Hon. Lord Adare has arrived at Cheltenham, and the Lord Bishop of Waterford has arrived in the City.

The Earl of Conyngham and Lord Jocelyn were amongst the passengers that arrived on Sunday night in the City, by the packet from Holyhead. On Monday, Col. Vincent and Lady, set out from his house on Arthur's-quay, for Dublin.
