Stephen Blake for aiding and assisting in forcing and carrying away Margaret Clark, of the Oil Mills, Co. Clare, to be publicly whipped three times through the town of Six-Mile-Bridge, to be confined 6 months and find good bail.—Laurence Considine, for the murder of his father-in-law, Mark Mahony, found guilty of manslaughter.—Wm. Kilderrery, for pig-stealing.—Mich. Brennan, for stealing a quantity of spirits, from Denis O'Connor.

Thursday last, a Trial for *Crim. Con.* came on in Ennis, before the Hon. Justice Mayne, and a Special Jury, in which Mr. Patrick O'Hennessey, Carpenter, was Plaintiff, and Mr. Foster Parsons, Printer, was Defendant—Damages were laid at 2000l. when after a hearing of eight hours, the Jury returned a verdict of 100l. and 6d. Costs for Plaintiff.

A few of the miscreants still have the hardihood to prou...at night about the roads of some parts of this County, and too often, with impunity, attack the houses of their peaceable neighbours, committing depredations on their tenements and property therein, and taking their horses for some fresh excursion;—Much as we would be concerned at the loss of the life of a fellow creature, we cannot but say that spirited exertion is a duty, in order to repel the midnight villain;—and in the relation of the following occurrence, we think it will be allowed that one of those marauders has met his desert.

On Wednesday night, the house of Mr. Jeremiah Donworth, a respectable farmer, residing at Garryfoine, in this County, between Croom and Charleville, was surrounded by upwards of a hundred of those deluded wretches, who not content with getting bridles, saddles, and other articles, insisted on his horses which were then fatigued; however, when they were going off, a son of Mr. Donworth's struck one of the heroes, Tim. Cronin, with a slane, on the head, which felled him to the earth, and caused his immediate death, when his comrades scampered off. The corpse was on Thursday viewed by four of the neighbouring Magistrates, David Roche, Henry Harding, James D. Lyons, and Wm. Smyth, Esqrs. who very properly sent in the body yesterday evening for interment in the New Gaol Yard (as a warning to those villains,) under the following authority.

"We herewith send you the body of Timothy Cronin, who came by his death in the act of nightly meeting, sounding horns, taking horses, and disturbing the peace of the County, him you are to bury in the Croppy hole, for which this shall be your sufficient authority.

The houses of David Punch and James Cooney, at Kilbeacon, were attacked on Wednesday night, by upwards of 200 fellows, who threatened to set fire to the habitations, had it not been they got an old musket at Punch's. The party were well armed, and fired several shots at their departure.
