

The Lord Bishop of Limerick, Ardfer, & Aghadoe, as summoned the Dean and Prebendaries of the Diocese of Ardfer, to meet him at that ancient Cathedral, on Tuesday, 23th, for the purpose of reviving and rendering efficient that long dormant Chapter; and on Thursday, 25th, his Lordship will hold his Annual Visitation, for Ardfer & Aghadoe, at Killarney Church. Yesterday, the Crown business in the County ended; the following received sentence, viz.

Cornelius Riordan, for the abduction of Mary Migan, to be hanged on Thursday the 6th Sept.
Edward Carroll, for nightly meetings, to be transported for life.

Thomas Curran, for stealing linen out of Newcastle Bleach Green, to be transported for seven years.

Edmond Dunn, for an assault on Dan. Ryan, to be confined 18 months.

John Brezan, for riotously assembling at night at Galbally, to be confined twelve months.

Mich. Dandon, for manslaughter, to be confined twelve months.

Pat. Donovan, for do. to be confined three months.

John Stakpole, for cutting Trees at Glin, to be confined three months.

Wm. M'Auliff, for riotously assembling at Laurenceown, to be confined three months.

Mary Fitzgerald, for robbery, to be confined two months, and whipped next Monday, and the last day of her confinement.

The following are the sentences on the undermentioned persons convicted in the City, as stated in our last Chronicle, viz.

Mich. Moylan, of Caherelly, mason, for burglary and robbery in the house of Michael Lynch, of Rich-hill, in the Liberties of this City, to be hanged on Saturday, 1st September.

Patrick M'Allister, for robbery, to be transported for seven years.

Judith Quinlan, for robbery, to be transported 7 years.

Ellen Gibbons, for larceny, to be imprisoned 3 months.

Mary Fitzpatrick, for stealing weights from Patrick M'ahan, to be imprisoned three months.

Catherine Carthy, for robbing John Harte and others, to be imprisoned three months.

James Devitt, a watchman, for manslaughter, to be imprisoned six months, burned in the hand, and to give security, self in 100l. and two sureties in 50l. each.

Mr. Wm. Bowles, for writing on the 12th of Nov. 1808, a scandalous and malicious letter to Geo. Evans Bruce, Esq. tending to defame and libel the character of the said Bruce—to be imprisoned two months.

On Wednesday last, a Cause was tried in the City Court-house, before the Right Hon. Lord Chief Baron, wherein James O'Sullivan, Esq. was Plaintiff, and the church-wardens of St. John's Parish, Defendants.—It appeared that the Defendants distrained from the Plaintiff for St. John's Parochial Taxes, charged out of Concessions in Clare-street, and that the Plaintiff had replenished the Distress, as he conceived the Premises were not in the Parish. After a number of witnesses being examined at both sides, and much argument adduced, a verdict was given for Mr. O'Sullivan—Twenty Shillings Damages, and 6d. Costs.

In a Cause for breach of promise of marriage, heard at this City, before the Right Hon. Lord Chief Baron and a respectable Jury, on Thursday last, in which Miss Christian Sargent, second daughter of Francis Sargent, Peter, Esq. of Crosbie Row, was plaintiff, and Mr. James Spring, defendant. The trial occupied the Court from 10 till 4 o'clock, a number of witnesses being examined, and much legal ability at both sides displayed—the Jury after a few minutes consideration returned a verdict for £500 damages, and 6d. costs.

The wisdom of the Legislature, by an Act of the last Session respecting passengers in carriages is obvious;—it is expressly declared, that none shall take more than six inside and ten outside, under a heavy penalty.
