The consequence of this has been that the Kingdoms have derived all the advantage of the revenue they have thus acquired by his ad- vantage through their ports, paying duties at their houses. Bonaparte is at present known to want of money, and he has no other means of his coffers emptied by the expensive war in Europe. Under these circumstances, this plan has been adopted for the purpose of replenishing them.— Indulgence, we fear, must not be calculated for any length of time, for as soon as the Emperor's revenues sufficiently increased, which is no doubt, will be shortly, he may put another plan upon the introduction of Colonial products. This scheme, we understand, has been for a long time in contemplation, and it is upon that subject the Chamber of Commerce has held several meetings. That the trade would have been carried on in this manner we had no conception till it appeared. This is supposed to have delayed the Emperor's journey to Holland, but now it is known that he will take his departure immediately, to manage the affairs of that country. The release of American property is talked of, though we do not know how to credit it; and it will be a matter of difficulty, since the sales have already begun. It is mentioned that another Minister is to be sent to the United States, for the purpose of inducing the country to a reconciliation with France, and to assist with England; but I apprehend that this is a speculation, founded upon those proceedings favourable to commerce in neutral vessels.— The decree has produced a powerful sensation here, and indeed the immense duties will act in a great manner as a prohibition of the introduction of the
