

Aug. 8.—The exact position that our army is known to few in this city, but it is said advantageous. Almeida is closely invested, and the French seem determined, if possible, to take it.

The Prefect and Sub-Prefect of Guadaloupe left for Portchester Castle, on Sunday last; they had their retinue with them. They have gone on their way to Staffordshire.

We are happy to announce the arrival of the home-bound Jamaica fleet.

The six unfortunate men convicted at Chelmsford of murder, only two, Swinny and Pearee confessed the sentence of the law yesterday evening—the others, Buckley, Fleming, Bronwick, and Sullivan, have been reprieved.

DUBLIN, AUGUST 20.

That a Committee be appointed to co-operate with Deputations from the other Parishes, to frame a Petition to Parliament, praying for a REPEAL of the most fatal measure, the ACT OF UNION.

The Church Wardens having put the question upon the Resolutions, they were carried unanimously.
