

of the Laws, permit me to address your Lordship upon a subject which calls not for commendation of itself, but which is a trumpet-tongued of damnation of the deed—a subject of the first magnitude within the cognizance of your Lordship's duty, inasmuch as the great multitude estimate the Constitution alone, by the manner in which the precepts are administered by the Magistracy. subject to which I beg leave to call your Lordship's attention, is, that of the case tried before the Barrister of the late Sessions of Cork, reported in the Public Prints of this City, and read, I presume, to you, by your Lordship—in which it is alleged, that Peter Crone, Esq. a Magistrate of this County, endeavoured to influence a man of the name of Chapman, to the perpetration of a Perjury, by urging Chapman to wear an Information of a Riot, against men of whom he had nothing to say; and also of having, in the face of this unsworn, but Signed Information, committed the persons therein charged, in custody to the Jail. That one of your Lordship's Magistrates had acted, is stated upon oath by Chapman—that Chapman had not so acted, is sworn by Mr. Crone himself.—Your Lordship sees, is not that species of contradictory testimony which might be the consequence of the influence of the ear of a party deceiving him in the observation of a fact, neither is it of that sort which could possibly be the result of erroneous remembrance. The conduct of Chapman, my Lord, appears not to be at variance with his interest—he being a Constable, under the peculiar controul of this very Magistrate, and had been in fact, threatened with the loss of his office for not complying with the iniquitous demand. Chapman, on the other hand, was every way interested, in the face of this country, of this most foul and infamous deed. The verdict of the Jury giving credit to Chapman's evidence of the assault committed upon Crone, gave him equal credit, of course, for every thing he asserted, and, consequently, in believing him, we believe Mr. Crone; and here, twelve men, and twelve oaths, to a man, the selection of the Crown, stamp their oaths *the truth of Chapman's accusation.*

It must, my Lord, excite surprise, what could persuade Mr. Crone to an act which must stand so high in the records of Magisterial profligacy—the only crime that can be assigned is, that of the Traverser having been a few weeks before polluted, by a kiss, the chaste lips of a mistress of a Capt. White, another Magistrate of this County, who, from the notoriety in the country of the presentment for this, did not hold it prudent to be committing Magistrate himself, and therefore desired his bosom friend Crone to act, as Mr. Crone admitted—and as this same Capt. White, thus avowedly interested in this business, had the depraved audacity to impeach the impartiality of the Bench, by sitting with the said Barrister, as one of the Magistrates to try the case.

And here, my Lord, in justice to a Noble Peer, I must permit me to remark, that the persecuting bail of 100l. demanded for each of these wretches, and that Mr. Crone stated in evidence that that sum was named by the Lord Doneraile; but that Noble Lord stands too high in the public estimation—is too justly beloved by the poor of the surrounding country, to connect himself with an act so highly unconstitutional, to participate in the oppression so revolting to the common feelings of humanity; his Lordship will not only disclaim any knowledge of this base transaction, by shielding Chapman from the infuriate vengeance of the *Twin Magistrates*, but by appointing him to some station in the County, more worthy his firmness and honesty.

Happy, happy England! whose bold Yeomen defend the laws, because they feel the power of its force, and protecting arm—ill-fated Ireland! be thine shame too oft, alas! to know the British Constitution be so abused—its delegated Authorities abusing their sacred functions, distorting the cheering safeguard of the peasant into the despot monster in the wanton hands of the nobility. In vain shall thy peasantry be told of the thralldom of France, and of those countries organizing under the dominion—In vain shall we boast to those of the presence of our Civil Liberty—in vain shall we stimulate them to the beach, to meet with their characteristic

Sunday morning, three children belonging to a poor man living near Roche's-town, Co. Cork, having strayed about the hedges, unfortunately were attracted by the redness of some berries, of which they were tempted to eat. Shortly after their return to their cottage, they were seized with dreadful vomiting, and all the symptoms of having eaten poison. Two of them, after lingering until Tuesday, died; but hopes are entertained for the recovery of the third.

John Stapleton, convicted of taking arms, and John Carroll, found guilty of horse stealing, at the Assizes of Kilkenny, have been respited by the Lord Lieutenant.

Thursday morning the Right Worshipful Mayor apprehended and lodged in Jail, John Nealon, charged with sheep stealing.

The Providence, Capt. Barclay, of and from London, arrived in Cove on Wednesday. She is to take on board the persons in the different gaols in Ireland, sentenced for transportation to Botany Bay.

The Treasurer of the Fever Hospital, has received from Count De Salis, 20 guineas, for that Institution.

Yesterday, Watson and Mahony received a Pound Note from an Officer in this Garrison, (who would not permit his name to be mentioned) in aid of the Charity, of which he had read an Address in the Chronicle of last Wednesday.
