DUBLIN—OCTOBER 4.

The Sessions for the County of Dublin at Rainham, and on the close of the public Grand Jury resolved on a Requisition to Mr. John Arthur, Esq. to convene a Freeholders of the County upon an early day of a Petition to his Majesty and the Parliament for a Repeal of the Legislature Ireland and Great Britain.—A Committee appointed to wait on the High Sheriff, Messrs. Stan and Shaw, in their answers to the late Aggregate Meeting have declared their intention to support the Petition for the Repeal of Union.

Merchant;—a Burgess of this City, having served the office of Sheriff in the year 1802; he had been for a considerable time seriously indisposed, and his dissolution was observed to approach with slow and steady pace.—His death, though thus expected, was a shock to his dear connexions, and a source of grief to all his friends and acquaintance;—his integrity and correctness in dealing were proverbial, and the manner in which he performed all the relative and social duties was ever conspicuous: his remains were this morning interred at Kilmurry, in the Liberties of this City.—In Walthamstow (England) William Ward, Esq. of Trinity College, Oxford.
