The Hon. in a spirited and most animated manner, view of the evils resulting from the Union, unhappy state to which the country had been and concluded a very luminous speech, by decided negative to the resolution. Auley declared, that the measure should have support, notwithstanding the sophistry of Gent. who had opposed the resolution, and introduced matter totally irrelevant; he diffused Sir James Riddal, as to the propriety of such a meeting, and yet he should be sorry to see the approbation which both had so well deserved their upright conduct during the whole of their activity, hospitality, and liberality never surpassed, and seldom equalled. Sir James Riddal passed a very high eulogium upon the Duke, both in his private and public capacity.— He then introduced a great measure to Sir Edw. Stanley's health, the accomplishment and good regulation of the Jubilee, which did so much credit to this city. Sir Edward Stanley then addressed the Assembly, and that he felt himself called upon by what had been said by the Hon. Gentleman who had opposed the measure, to aver that he was as independent as that of any Gentleman that heard him. He had not been the subject of undue influence; to such language, Sir Edward stated, he had for some time back listened with contempt; he despised popular clamour and should ever be informed the Hon. Gentleman that he was actuated by a sense of his duty and by that alone, and that he had the spirit to perform, although the Government was denounced against him; the exertions of every day convinced him that he did not err in his judgment, and the result of this day would place a doubt; at all times, said Sir Edward, the members of this Guild, the most respectable in the Kingdom because in London they have a Guild of Merchants, must be gratifying to me, but this particular will make an impression that cannot be defaced. He then addressed the Hon. Gentleman, he being the same of the Guild, and then he had as to my opinion in the particular instance which the Hon. Gent. strongly censured. I do not impute improper motives to that gentleman, but it appears to me that he came to this Hall from a popular meeting of the Duke of Mayo, to express those opinions which he expressed there, and that whilst he is addressing you in traversing the County of Mayo; the Hon. Gent. informed you that I am an advocate for the Union; I never given any such opinion, but I felt that of the persons who took an active lead in the late war, were influenced by a desire to embarrass the Government, and in doing so they wanted to take advantage of the distresses of the manufacturing classes at the moment; they were as careless about the Government about any other subject that would have answered their nefarious purposes.—But Sir Edward said that he had the blessings of the British Constitution, and would lend his aid to such unworthy motives. Sir Edward's speech was loudly applauded, and after the resolutions from Mr. O'Donnell, the address was carried, with only two dissenting voices.

We are sincerely sorry that Lieut. Ralph Ouseley, of the 48th Regt. is amongst the killed in the engagement at Busaco, on the 27th ult. under Lord Wellington—he served with the Regiment during its campaign in Portugal, and was present at all the skirmishes that lately occurred, in which the British were concerned—at the Battle of Talavera, as ensign, he gallantly distinguished himself,—for one of the Officers being mortally wounded early in the action, he instantly seized both standards and continued to do so, though pressed on by repeated charges until the contest terminated.—He was son of the late Ralph Ouseley, Esq. of this City, had not attained his eighteenth year, and was highly esteemed by his Brother Officers—his premature death is a source of much agony to his Friends in Limerick.

Lieutenant Colthurst, of the 83d Regt. son of Major Colthurst, was in the above action, slightly wounded.

On Tuesday last, Denis Connell, of Kilbolane, farmer, was brought into Charleville, and a ball extracted from his thigh by Mr. Fitzmaurice, Surgeon, in that town, received in defending his house the night before, from a number of insurgents displeased at his employing some Kerry-men to assist in digging his potatoes.—We are concerned to hear, that the poor man's life is in imminent danger. The cause of offence sufficiently shews of what description and character those deluded wretches are, who would willingly run the hazard of starving their own families, to add 6d. a day to their hire for a few weeks; but though they are of the lowest class, the Magistrates of the County are not less called on to put down such lawless proceedings.

A great number of men attacked the house of Mr. Butler, of Coolmore, Co. Tipperary, during his absence, on Wednesday se'night, for the purpose, it is supposed, as usual, of taking his arms; but we are happy to find they were disappointed in their object, being beat off by the determined resistance of Mr. B.'s tutor, who fired two shots at them, one of which it is believed took effect. The villains fired several shots at the house, one of which struck a window, at which the tutor stood, but providentially without injuring him.

A Court Martial has been sitting for some days past at the Tontine Coffee-House, Cork—and Tuesday and Wednesday at the Old Custom House, for the trial of Capt. Armstrong, of the 12th Royal Veteran Bat. on charges preferred against him by the prosecutor, Capt.
