

respondent, and thereupon the Judge pronounced sentence in this cause, and in favour of respondents. He judged him entitled to a sentence of Divorce and separation from appellant (on account of the clear and proved adultery of appellant,) from bed and board, they are reconciled. The Archbishop of Dublin having previously consented thereto (and Swift, the respondent's Proctor, having exhibited the usual bond) the approbation and consent aforesaid, signed his decree accordingly on the 15th of May last—the applicant protesting at the act of appealing from the sentence.—The argument of Counsel, and observations of Mr. Smith, when giving the judgment of the Court, were reported at a future day.

Monday last, the Earl Annesley, attended at the Police Office, in Duke-street, and complained that a false report had been circulated that his Lordship had been concerned in causing the late disappearance of the boy called Charles Annesley.—Mr. John and Thomas Lees also attended to sustain his Lordship's complaint and the persons accused are ordered to attend on Monday next. The Hon. Wm. Wellesley Pole, Chief Secretary to the Lord Lieutenant, sailed for England, on Saturday. It is a regret to hear, that a Barrister of fashionable eminence in this city, attempted, on last Thursday, to put an end to his existence with a pistol, the ball of which fortunately only grazed the vertebrae of the neck. Some embarrassment in the payment of a sum of money, lost last week, is said to be the cause of this rash act.—R. H. nearly 800 fine bullocks were landed last week at Malinbeg from Dublin.

### Limerick, November 14.

On the night of the 11th ult. a numerous party of men armed with muskets and pistols, surrounded the residence of Thomas Noonan, of Fanningstown, farmer, after breaking open the door of the House entered and took Noonan, sen. from his bed, and having struck him down with the butt end of a musket, most cruelly flogged him with a black thorn bush on the back—they fired a loaded pistol at him, but which did not hurt him—they were going to fire at him again, but the intervention of the party interfering, they gave him his life, after tendering him an oath to quit that part of the country he lived in, left him; Information of the above transaction having been lodged before E. V. Fitz-Gerald, a Magistrate of this County—he left this on Friday with a party of the 1st Dragoons, (King's German Legion) and proceeding to the neighbourhood of Tullymore where he succeeded in apprehending Denis Hayes, who was the principal in, and commander of said party, he being fully identified by old Noonan and his wife.

He was safely lodged in the Co. Jail on Saturday. On last Saturday night, Margaret Carmody, alias Honan, put an end to her existence by hanging herself in the chimney of Rathkeal. A Coroner's Inquest was held on Monday, on Sunday, and a verdict of "Insanity" was returned by the Jury.

An inquest was held by Thomas Simpson, Esq. at Rathkeal, on Friday last, on the body of Matthew Ryan, a cooper, who received a severe contusion on the forehead, on the 29th ult. since which time he languished in extreme torture, and expired last Thursday evening.—Several witnesses were examined, from whose testimony the Jury returned the following verdict:—"That Matthew Ryan came by his death in consequence of a stroke of apoplexy he received from Luke Shinnors, which fractured his skull."

Monday last, a route was received for three companies of the North Cork regiment, to march this day and tomorrow, for Ennis, Clare, &c. to replace three companies of the Leitrim Militia, who are to join their companies in this garrison—the Staff of the North Cork still remains here.

Monday next a General Court Martial will assemble at Fermoy, for the trial of an Officer of the Duke of Devonshire's Cavalry.—Major-General Baron Bock is to be the President.

On Saturday evening last, the Right Worshipful F. Lloyd, Esq. A Butcher was on Saturday last, fined 5s. by one of the City Magistrates, for slaughtering a Sheep in the public Market.

Friday last, His Majesty's ship Endymion, sailed from Cove on a cruize.

CLONMEL, NOV. 12—Tuesday night, a poor industrious man of the name of Mulcahy, on his return home to near Ballyveelish, was met by four men who beat him most violently and fractured his skull. He is now lying under the care of Surgeon Phillips, with very little hopes of recovery. The only reason that can be assigned for this barbarous outrage is, the unwillingness of Mulcahy to join either of the factious parties which have so long infested this Country.
