

NOV. 21.—This evening arrived the packet, Captain Bull, with mails and dispatches, seven days passage. We are still in the midst of a battle in Portugal; the hostile forces are in statu quo. Lord Wellington is receiving reinforcements from various quarters, and making every preparation for the grand attack. By all accounts must very shortly take place. Two thousand seamen and marines have been embarked in the ships of war and transports in the Bay of Biscay. His Majesty's ships Diadem, 44, en flute, arrived in the Tagus on the 23d inst. with the 23d regiment from Halifax; and ships Agincourt 64, and La Brune 40, en flute, arrived from Portsmouth, with troops, &c. on the 3d inst. in eight days passage. The 1st inst. in the Tagus his Majesty's ships Bar-saout 98, Tonnant 80, Cesar 80, Im-mer 74, Kent 74, Elizabeth 74, Policiers 44, Zealous 74, Diadem 64, Agincourt 64, frigates and sloops of war, and upwards of 100 other vessels. The next accounts from the East most probably be brought by a ship of the name of Wales packet had not arrived at the Marlborough left that place.
