

Limerick, December 12.

Readers will find in this day's Chronicle, the contents of the LONDON PAPERS of last week—received by EXPRESS.

The 1st Regt. being made complete by volunteers of the 1st Militia, sailed last week from Dublin for Limerick. The Armagh Regt. Militia, has replaced them in their quarters at the Royal Barracks.

Permanent Serjeants from Yeomanry Corps of the 1st and adjoining districts, have arrived in Limerick for the purpose of placing themselves under the command of the Officer of this garrison, to be attached to the troops for drill, during the space of one month, until they shall be perfect in exercise; pursuant to orders issued by his Grace the Lord Lieutenant and mentioned in the Limerick Chronicle.

Mr. F. Prittie and Family have arrived at Mr. Prittie's house, in Arlington-street, London.

It is understood that the Board of Trade has refused to grant further Licenses, for the introduction, by ships, into British ports, of any articles from the Continent, for the purpose of raising grain.

The principal houses in Newry and Drogheda, have agreed to take as cash, the Notes of Beresford & Co. of the new Firm in all payments. The Bank of Ireland Company, have given directions along the same, and have every facility afforded to the circulation of the notes.

On Monday last, in the Court of King's Bench, came on before Lord Ellenborough, a cause in which Dubost, a French painter, was plaintiff, and Mr. Beresford, son of the Archbishop of Tuam, was defendant, to recover 1000 Guineas, the alleged value of a picture, publicly exhibited in rooms at Pall Mall, called the Representation of Beauty and the Ugly, which was evidently intended to caricature Mrs. Beresford, the former sister of, and the latter brother of, the Defendant—which painting Mr. Beresford cut into pieces with a knife, for being an object of scurrility. After several witnesses on the part of the Plaintiff, and an attempt to prove the supposed value set on the Painting, which at the time was only two or three pounds a day, and afterwards reduced to twenty;—and without any evidence on the part of the Defendant, the learned Judge most properly ordered that the Plaintiff lost all right to compensation, either as to loss of profit or as to the value of the picture, as they were only the means of unlawful gain, and that no compensation could be provided by the law. The Jury would confine the damages to the value of the WOOD, CANVAS, and COLOURS.—Verdict—For the Plaintiff, 40s. costs.

Mr. Nevins, daughter of Pim Nevins, Esq. of Leeds, had a most miraculous escape from a horse near Leeds:—While taking an airing on Monday night, along with her brother; the bridle of the horse, on which she was mounted, broke, and she, finding herself without restraint, bounded full speed down the steep hill leading to the bottom of which, a brave fellow, of the name of Smael Noble, servant of Mr. Gilward, seeing the danger of his own life, stopped the horse, and rescued the fair rider from her perilous situation.
