

ere, Rammakins and Ardminger marched through Middleburgh for Flushing. When the whole had passed, en. Don proceeded, and embarked in the flag-ships, trusting the rear-guard to Lieut. Col. Stuart, of the 5th regiment, consisting of a troop of light dragoons, the brigade of light artillery, and a battalion of infantry; this guard remained 15 days in Middleburgh;—

Sir R. Strachan, with the transports, arrived in the Downs on Wednesday, having sailed from Flushing Roads on the preceding day. At the same time the flotilla in the Roompot and the West Scheldt, under the command of Captains Owen and Mason, was withdrawn, without, as we understand, any attempt from the enemy to harrass it on the retreat.

It was the 1st. bat. of the 50th regiment that landed at Deal on Wednesday from Flushing. The number of men landed in good health was 250, and they occupied Silver Hill Barracks, where they performed the important duty of rear guard.

The 6th Regiment arrived from Flushing, and have marched for Dover. Sir Michael Seymour, Bart. has sent in a valuable prize to Plymouth, which he captured on Christmas day. Orders have been dispatched, to prepare 10 stout frigates to be immediately sent to the East Indies.

Nehemiah Taylor, Esq. Surgeon of his Majesty's ship Jamaica, was on Tuesday last hanged on board said ship at Portsmouth, pursuant to sentence, for an abominable offence.

INDIA.

Private accounts, received by the late arrivals from Bombay, communicate intelligence of a most unpleasant nature: these not only confirm the previous information, of the existence of a serious misunderstanding between the Civil Government of one of the Indian Presidencies and the Military, but add a particular not generally known in this country, that one of the company's regiments had forcibly possessed itself of the fort of Masanipatam.—The commanding officer of the regiment is said to have been previously placed under arrest by the soldiery. The accounts do not state, whether the fort had been subsequently surrendered by the mutineers, though mention is made, that after a vain attempt to divide the regiment by ordering small detachments from it, Colonel Malcolm had been sent to the northward with conciliatory proposals, and had returned to Madras without effecting the purport of his mission. The immediate circumstances, which led to this extraordinary measure, are not very accurately explained.

The obnoxious officers, who were supposed to have taken an active share in the circulation of memorials within their respective commands, and who, according to foregoing accounts, had been, in consequence, ordered to the Presidency, for the purpose of taking their passage to Europe, had arrived at Madras; and one of them, an officer of distinction and family, had been sent in close arrest to Ponnammallee, the depot of the French and Dutch prisoners. We are ignorant of the cause of this seemingly strong measure; but it certainly does not appear calculated to allay the ferment in the army, nor very consistent with the policy adopted in the preceding instance.

Letters from Bombay state, that the pirates in the Persian Gulph, owing to the supineness of the local government in that quarter, had increased to a most formidable body, and had carried on their depredatory warfare with unusual success, and more than usual barbarity. The Minerva, Hopwood, had been recently captured, and her passengers and crew most inhumanly treated. The list of captures was so extensive, as to force the consideration of the subject on the attention of the Bombay Government. A naval and military force had in consequence been ordered to proceed to the Gulph. Three frigates, with numerous transports, and a part of the 65th regiment with a detachment of Sepoys and artillery, had been destined to this service. But the arrangements for the dispatch of this force to the proposed scene of action were so slowly prosecuted, that the Monsoor set in before the expedition sailed from the harbour, so that the transports were likely to remain in demerage for more than two months. This delay, however, will give the Government time to consider of the adequacy of the force intended to have been employed to the object in view, and may possibly lead them to enlarge the scale of the armament. The pirates are stated, in round numbers, at 12,000 men
