**LONDON—JAN. 15.**

A private letter of the 6th inst. from Lisbon, informs us that the British head-quarters are at Coimbra.

One of the Portuguese papers contains a long instrument in the name of Pope Pius VII. giving a detailed account of the proceedings of the French in the Papal territory. This document is entitled—"Apostolical Letters"—is accompanied by a Papal Brief, by which the authors, agents, and abettors of the usurpation of the State of Rome, and other States appertaining to the Holy See, are declared excommunicated!!

Three Gottenburgh mails are arrived. It is not from Sweden that we receive any longer intelligence that excites much interest. She has sunk into insignificance, the vassal of France and Russia, just as much as any of those petty Princes of Germany, who, if Bonaparte were to order them to eat straw, must eat it. She has been permitted to make peace with France, and Bonaparte has given her back Pomerania—a cession for which some of her contemporaries seem at a loss to account—to us his policy is obvious—had he retained Pomerania himself, or given it to any of his minions, he could not have kept Sweden so decisively under his subjection as he can by giving her back a territory which he knows and she knows is always at his mercy. He commands Sweden through Pomerania just as he thinks he might secure an interest, or be able to have some influence over a King of England, by giving him back Hanover—a King of England in possession of Hanover would, he may suppose, be less inclined to take decisive measures against him, the first effect of which would be the wresting that territory from him—and hence, though the Orleans and Foxites, when they were in power, were so decisive in maintaining that Hanover ought to be as dear to us as Hampshire, we doubt whether, in the present state of the Continent, it would not be a wiser policy that a King of England should not be in possession of Hanover, which he could only hold by being, in his quality of Elector of Hanover, the subject and vassal of Bonaparte.

The gallant Gustavus and his family have finally quitted Sweden and arrived at Stralsund, from whence they are to proceed to Switzerland, and afterwards probably to France.

Among other proposed enquiries in Parliament, it would be extraordinary were not an investigation to be instituted into the causes of the almost entire disappearance of specie from the country. This is a subject of the highest importance to the guardians of the public

to ape his brother, and that having no hopes of issue by his wife, he thinks seriously of repudiating her, and of taking back his first wife.

Bonaparte is lavishing upon the divorced Josephine pensions and palaces. She has had a palace at Paris given her, and another at Brussels, besides Malmaison. Bonaparte has added a million of livres from his own private purse.

In consequence of the French Decree, a great number of vessels have, within these three days, arrived at different ports of this kingdom with grain, butter, cheese, and other articles.

The American Consul Forbes has been obliged to fly from Hamburg. Four vessels having arrived there under the flag of the U. States, and provided with American papers, he denounced them as having come from England. They were of course seized and sequestered. The popular indignation was so much excited in consequence, that Mr. Forbes found it convenient to withdraw to Hanover.

The American navy consists of five frigates, five brigs, two schooners, and one cutter, with about 20 gun-boats and bombs, at New Orleans—army they have not any, for their undisciplined militia, thinly scattered over a vast extent of country (and which on several late occasions has proved inadequate to the purposes of police) is undeserving the appellation, and is destitute of the character.

On Wednesday, Mr. John Pawson, surgeon's assistant of his Majesty's ship Crocodile, was tried at Portsmouth, by a Court Martial, for absenting himself without leave—dismissed his ship, and put at the bottom of the list of assistant surgeons of the Royal Navy.

We are yet without any copy of the dispatches from Gen. Areizaga, and it now seems that the particulars of the defeat of Ocana, were so disgraceful to the Spaniards, that the Central Junta has thought fit to suppress the publication of them.

Major-General Cotton, arrived in Downing-street on Saturday with dispatches from Lord Wellington. Gen. Cotton landed at Plymouth on Thursday, from the Pickle brig, after a passage of seven days. The British army was then proceeding to take up a new position more to the northward, for the purpose of opposing a strong French force under the command of Soult and Kellerman, which, it was supposed, intended to enter the north of Portugal. The French army under Victor, it was apprehended, would endeavour to force the Sierra Morena at the same time. The Spanish army, under the Duke of Parque, occupies Ciudad Rodrigo, and the mountainous tract adjacent, and will be able to form a junction, or co-operate with the British troops, as may be judged necessary.

The letters from Bordeaux, which are to the 8th inst. speak of the passage of troops towards the Pyrenees, in much greater numbers than at any period since the peace of Vienna. Those from Gascony are three days later, and are confined to commercial matters: They speak with great confidence of the restoration of intercourse with the ports of Europe, through the medium of neutral vessels, and inclose lists of a great variety of articles of export and import to maintain it.

Earl Grey presented a petition to the Majesty on Wednesday, for a license or patent to erect a new theatre in London.

It is confidently expected that the British army under Lord Wellington, at the date of the last advices, did not exceed 12,000 men fit for actual service.

The Officers of the 7th, 10th, 15th, and 18th regiments of Light Dragoons, have subscribed upwards of 1500l. for the purpose of purchasing a piece of plate to present to Lieut-General Paget, Colonel of the 7th regiment; among the subscribers are the Prince of Wales 200l. and the Duke of Cumberland the like sum.

The Blossom sloop of war is arrived at Yarmouth; she parted with the Baltic Convoy in a thick fog four days ago; they were in number about 400. Upwards of 170 were prizes to the Baltic squadron.

The Ocean, Albion, Trafalgar, and Favourite transports, from Heligoland, were captured on or about the 16th November, and driven on shore near Calais.

A Gentleman who left Bordeaux on the 7th instants says it was reported there before he came away, that Napoleon had either married, or was on the point of marrying the Princess of Saxony.

CAMBRIDGE.—The following is the subject for the Hulsean premium for the present year:

"The remarkable propensity of the Jews to idolatry, before the Babylonish captivity, compared with their exemption from it, in general, afterwards, affords the unbeliever no just ground for rejecting the scriptural account of the miracles in the time of Moses and Joshua."

Lord S. C. is the Nobleman whom it was lately attempted to carry off from the Isle of Man.

Mr. Lewis, Governor General of Upper Louisiana, lately shot himself in consequence of the American Government having refused to pay a Bill he had drawn.

Isle of Bourbon—From recent accounts, we have the pleasure of being able to lay before our readers, some further detail respecting the capture of the forts and towns of St. Paul with the shipping, &c.—It appears, that on the morning of the 21st Sept. about 250 of our brave soldiers, and 200 of our Royal Marines, were landed before day-break and soon carried three of the forts. The squadron went in and fired three broadsides and then hawled out; the Sirius frigate, Captain Pim, stood in again, and anxious to avail himself of the only opportunity that presented itself to his vigilant eye, he asked leave, and was permitted, by signal from the Commodore, to anchor, and accordingly, in the most gallant style carried his little ship in and placed her within pistol shot of the beach, and half musket shot of the Caroline French frigate, and the two East-Indiamen, and a French brig of war, and opened so heavy a fire on them from his English bull dogs, that in 20 minutes (the troops at the same time charging through the town) the whole struck their colours. Both army and navy joined in praise of this brilliant enterprise, declared they had never seen or thought it possible for a ship to keep up so tremendous a fire as the Sirius exhibited on that occasion; and we understand it was principally owing to the very great exertions of Capt. Pym, his Officers and Crew, that the two Indiamen were saved from being burnt; or that any of the stores and goods from the shore were taken off and put on board the Streatham.

All the Irish estates of the Grogan family, in the Co. of Wexford, forfeited by the attainder of the head of that family, in the late rebellion, have been restored to it by letters patent under the great seal of this kingdom.

In consideration of the important benefits which the Dublin Society have derived from the services of the Right Hon. Mr. Foster, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, that most respectable Body have requested him to sit for his picture, for the purpose of its being placed in a conspicuous situation in the house of the Society.—Mr. Foster has been pleased to accede to the request, and the picture is to be painted by Sir Wm. Beechy.

Last week a deputation from the corn distillers of Ireland, waited on the Irish Chancellor of the Exchequer at the Commissioner of Inquiry's house, Dominick-street, in order to represent to him, the serious losses they have laboured under, by being prevented from distilling. We understand that he received them in the most favourable and friendly manner, and gave them every reason to hope that the restriction they complained of would be removed next session, as Mr. Perceval had changed his opinion, and as he believed, that Sir John Newport would discontinue his opposition: they remarked, however, that unless the present duties on spirits were lowered, that removing the prohibition would afford them no relief, as they could not distill under such circumstances, in which opinion Mr. Foster coincided.

Earl Gower, eldest son of the Marquis of Stafford, is fixed upon by the Opposition, to propose an Amendment upon the Address to his Majesty.

The Lord Mayor and Lady have issued cards of invitation for a masked ball to be given at the Mayoralty House, on Friday the 9th of February. It is intimated in the card, much to the credit of Sir Wm. Stamer, that the guests are expected to appear in new dresses of Irish manufacture.

Liverpool alone imported during the last year from Ireland, to the amount of 1,839,348l. 15s. 6d.

Captain John Spearing, of the Royal Marines, is dismissed the Service for embezzlement.

A Lady of distinction is threatened by prosecution, on a charge of poisoning a witness, to prevent him from giving evidence in a case in which she felt an interest.

On the night of Thursday the 11th inst. a melancholy accident happened in the neighbourhood of Kells. In consequence of having fire in a room without a chimney, three men who slept in it were found suffocated the following morning.
