He stated that Lady Annesley had most positively (and truly might have,) denied every charge made against her in the letters written by Foley, and that Mr. who was charged with being the author, absolutely denied that he had ever made such charges against Annesley or Mrs. Grove, or that any such circumstances ever existed.

In a couple Mr. Jefferyes with this transaction, it appeared by the affidavit, that he had delivered the letter open to a gentleman to deliver it to Mrs. Grove, and that he had called upon her the day and asked her if she had got the letter he had sent and told her he had several copies of it to send to the branches of her family, and which he would not settle with him; and as further evidence of the conspiracy between the defendants to defame Mrs. Grove and Lady Annesley, it appeared upon the affidavit, that said Jefferyes pretended that he had had a conversation with Mr. Furlong, and wrote a letter directed to his mother (Mrs. Grove) to the following effect:—"Mr. Furlong, on my putting questions to him, acknowledged that he did not know of a conspiracy against M<sup>r</sup>. Veigh and Martin Connor, and warned them both, and he gave M<sup>r</sup>. Connor a copy of his protection, and three days after said M<sup>r</sup>. Veigh was dead, &c.—Martin since professed his life by pistols, guns, &c. &c."—and it also appeared on the affidavit, that Mr. Jefferyes did, on or about the 17th Dec. last, send to his mother (Mrs. G.) a letter purporting to be the copy of a letter intended to be sent to the Lord Lieutenant, and which he threatened would be sent before three o'clock that day, unless she settled with him, and which was to the effect:—"Your Grace will have the goodness to send to Denis Hinchy late of the Ordnance, now in the neighbourhood of Cork, to come on the receipt of your Grace's order, to the Castle of Dublin, to answer such questions as your Grace shall think fit to put to him, relative to the murder of M<sup>r</sup>. Veigh, and a conspiracy against the life of Martin Connor; then persons of this nature, concerned in this business, shall be made known to you in two days." The only ground which appeared in Lady Annesley's affidavit, why the defendants had any malice against her, was that she had, at the instance of Mrs. Grove, lent Mr. Jefferyes, at a time he was much distressed, a large sum of money, for which, after the death of it for some years, she was obliged to sue him, and for which he had vowed vengeance against her. Mr. Furlong, to his honor, though employed against Lady Annesley in a very adverse suit, authorised her Counsel to state, that every thing respecting any conversation with him and Mr. Jefferyes to the purposes in the affidavit stated, was false and unfounded; and he very honorably attended in person, for the purpose of making that declaration on the part of himself and his client, if it should have been necessary so to do. The Court were unanimous in granting the conditional order for the information; and never did we witness greater indignation or horror expressed upon any occasion, than was expressed both by the Bar and the audience at large at the infamous matter disclosed by the affidavit of the Prosecutrix.

### Limerick, February 3.

The Lord Lieutenant in Council has offered £200 reward for the apprehension of some Combinators who wrote several threatening anonymous letters to Merchants and Cotton Manufacturers in Dublin, particularly one of a most horrid nature to Messrs. O'Brien, Meade and Co. expressive of the intention of those nefarious fellows to burn the premises of those respectable merchants, as was done lately by means of a combustible machine introduced into the concerns of Mrs. Bridget Maguire, in that City, or to murder them; and "that they were satisfied to die for shooting or burning them, and that O'Brien & Co. may depend on either being shortly done."

Count De Salis arrived on Thursday, at Standish Grady's, Esq. of Grange, in this County, from visiting his Estates in the North of Ireland.

By the exertions of Captain Elsmere, of the Resolution cutter, a large private distillery was found at full work on the Rocks; convenient to Mutton Island—after spilling a vast quantity of spirits, potale, &c. &c. he lodged all the utensils in the King's Stores, Kilrush.

His Grace the Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to appoint David Arthur England, Esq. of Cahircalla, Barrack Master of Clare Castle, in the room of John Hickman, Esq. deceased.

A meeting of the Roman Catholics of the County and City of Kilkenny, was held yesterday in Kilkenny, on the subject of Petitioning Parliament for a repeal of the existing Penal Laws.

The Pensions to the Widows of Officers in the Army and Marines, due at May, will commence payment on Wednesday next.
