### DUBLIN, APRIL 9.

SECOND EDITION of the CORRESPONDENT We have exclusively received intelligence from London so late as half past 4 o'clock on Saturday evening. At that hour Sir Francis Burdett was still at his house in Piccadilly, before which were at the time the Horse-Guards patrole.

From the Morning Chronicle of Saturday, we take the following Paragraph :-

"Sir Francis arrived in town about one o'clock, where he received a note from the Serjeant at Arms, informing him of the order of the House for his committal, and requesting to know when he should wait upon him with the Speaker's warrant, for the purpose of accompanying him to the Tower. Sir Francis, however, had not been many minutes at his house when Mr. Colman entered, and he was informed that the Hon. Baronet would be at leisure to speak with him about twelve o'clock this day. Upon this Mr. Colman departed; but about six o'clock in the evening he again called, and stating to Sir Francis that he had the Speaker's order to execute the would not go with him. Mr. Colman urged the authority of his warrant, and that he was entitled, if he thought proper, to call in aid for its enforcement. Sir Francis denied the authority of such an instrument, alledging his right to call in aid if he thought proper to resist its execution, and expressed his resolution to repel force by force. Here the conversation terminated, and Mr. Colman withdrew."

Lord Moira, the Constable of the Tower, went there early yesterday morning, to give the necessary orders for providing accommodation and apartments for Sir F. Burdett. If the crowd was considerable at Piccadilly, it was still more numerous at the Tower, and in all the adjacent streets where there was any probability of Sir Francis passing. Towards the evening the assemblage of the people was immense. In the course of the day, the Lord wlayor, it is said, sent a Note to the Secretary of State, requesting that Sir Francis might not be sent to the city, as he was apprehensive of some violation of the public peace.

About mid-day, several parties were going about in different parts of Westminster, procuring the signatures of housekeepers in support of their Representative, and in the course of the day the following placard was gene-

rally posted up through the town :

BURDETT .-- WESTMINSTER. A Resolution is signing for a Public Meeting of the Electors of the City and Liberties of Westminster, to adopt such measures as may be expedient, in consequence of the House of Commons having deprived us of one of

our Representatives. A Meeting, we understand, was held last night at the Crown and Anchor, by several of the Electors, chiefly of the old Committee, for the purpose of framing a set of Resolutions, to be proposed at the Public Meeting, which is to take place early next week.

FARTHER PARTICULARS. In the evening, the multitude assembled before the door of Sir F. Burdett was so great as completely to obsmuct the passage through Piccadilly. Between eight and nine o'clock, a detachment proceeded to attack a house in Herkeley-square supposed to be Mr. Lethridge's, but which is now in the possession of Mr. Raikes. The mob had, however, destroyed the whole of the windows before the mistake was discovered. We understand that the dead body of Mrs. Raikes, who died within these few days, was at that time in the house. The mob next proceeded to the house of Lord Castlereagh, in King's street, St. James's of which the whole of the windows were instantly demolished. Returning again to Berkelev-square, the crowd attacked Lord Dertmouth's house, and treated it in the same manner. They then proceeded to the house of Mr. Yorke, which experienced so violent an attack, that in a moment not a bane of glass remained whole. Mr. Perceval's windows were also broken. These proceedings induced some of the inhabitants to put lights in their windows, in the hopes that they would thereby avert the fury of the assulants. The circumstance was quickly seized upon by the multitude, and they very inconsistently reactived lights to be shewn as a proof of concurrence in their sentiments respecting Sir Francis Burdett. The consequence was, that all the streets in the West end of the town were brilliantly illuminated. A large mob was advancing against Lord Chatham's house in Hillstreet, but a troop of the Horse Guards, which had been called out, very opportunely met the assailants, and dispersed them.

The Guards were called out, and 350 men were sent to protect the Magazine in Hytle Park. Some of the guns at the Tower were loaded with grape shot. No person is admitted to pass to and from the Tower, without specifying his business. The immense mob about the Tower, is constantly vociferating . Burdett for ever. in the course of yesterday, Sir Francis Burnett was

visited by Sir Samuel Romilly, Mr. Whithread, Mr. Wardle, Lord Folkstone, and Lord Thanet. In addition to the attack, which we have stated above

to have been made by the mob on the windows of certain houses, we have to notice one made on the house of Sir J. Anstruther, which, it is said, has suffered considerably, not only the windows, but some glasses, chandeliers, and other valuable furniture in the interior of the rooms, are said to be destroyed.
