

According to the last intelligence from the French have been compelled to evacuate the point of Santa Maria, after an action, in which the Portuguese Regiment, No. 20, took a share. The report of the French having raised the blockade of Astorga, is also confirmed.

Badajos, April 11.—Our combined army has defeated the French in Chiclana, Molina, and Puerto Real; in consequence of the success, numbers of wounded arrived in St. Lucia, and our communications by land with Cadiz is open; it is also said that our army intends to make a descent upon Santa Maria, where the enemy has established his headquarters, and that it would already have been effected but for the boisterousness of the weather. General Ballesteros continues to occupy the Sierra Morena, and to harass the enemy. General Carrara is this day to arrive in Coria with his division. A dreadful day to arrive in Coria is expected, which, from the tried energy of our chiefs, and the revived enthusiasm of the army, will, we trust, prove destructive to the legion of harpies which despoil our peninsula.

Lisbon Gazette, April 11.—The enemy remain in their positions, threatening apparently in place, but we are animated with valour and enthusiasm; and if the means of subsistence do not fail, they will attack in vain, though they bring against us a much greater force than they have yet proved.

The desertion of the enemy in the principality of Catalonia is extraordinary; less than 1900 men have come over to our banner within a short time.

LONDON—APRIL 26 & 27.

His Majesty's Papers of the 22d inst. that Napoleon and his Empress will have sailed from their proposed visit to Antwerp before the 1st of May, and from a succession of articles in the "Ina Gazette," which announce the expectation of "fest events," it is possible that some arrangements between France and Austria are in progress. It was said, and indeed, more than insinuated in the "Patriot," that the marriage of the Archduchess was to be followed by some cession of territory to her. This may be one of the great events, which are objects of public expectation in Vienna.

His papers have received to the 23d. They are of little importance. His Bonaparte has vouchsafed to inform the Legislature that they may expect every support from him! The Letters and Papers by the Lisbon mail were delivered this morning. Ballesteros has advanced further into Ronquillo. But the enemy have made no attempt to dislodge him from a position, which renders his position at Seville insecure. Vial Ballesteros has advanced thus far on one side, and Blake is said to have got to Despena Peras, with a force of 25,000 men, but no mention is made of the siege of Astorga. The enemy are said to have been driven from the post of Santa Maria. I should, the general opinion of the intelligence by the mail is, as our friends will see by the above is extremely favorable.

Shaw, the Minister, arrived last night with dispatches from Cadiz, which represent that city in a state of complete confusion. It is supposed that the apprehension of water have been removed by the discovery of some wells in the vicinity of a very good quality. It is supposed that a system of offensive operations will be speedily adopted, and an attack will be made upon the French in their position at Chiclana. Meanwhile they are said to be suffering a want of provisions, occasioned by the interception of their convoys by the armed peasantry distributed in their rear. It seems therefore to be probable that they will retire from the neighbourhood of the Isle of Leon, than that they will make any serious demonstrations against it.

Their grand plan of making themselves masters of Valencia, was less on the strength of their arms than on the success of their intrigues. They had bribed some persons in the city to raise a disturbance, in the midst of which they were to be thrown open, and the troops advanced. The plot was happily discovered, and the French immediately retired, harassed in their retreat by the troops and peasantry that were crowding Valencia, to assist in its defence. The number of persons who were executed, are said to have been 200, twenty of whom are said to have been executed.

After this appointment the French withdrew towards Tudela and Albaracin, on the southern boundary of Spain; and it is probable that they proceeded to the place we have named to Tarazona. We hear from thence, of the 18th inst. several days subsequent to the event, which mentions that the Spanish troops were in a condition to force the French in that neighbourhood to abandon their position, and that the latter was hastening to the town, which was in full pursuit.

It is prudent to remove the French prisoners from Cadiz, and the transports which have conveyed the British troops thither are engaged on this duty. We understand, to be conveyed to Seville. The military force in Cadiz amounts to 20,000 men, including the Spaniards, British and Portuguese, and it is stated that 20,000 of them are retained in the city, and the remainder are employed in offensive operations against the French.

General, at the head of 12,000 Frenchmen, had a skirmish with little resistance. He was, however, has been very different from what we had reason to hope, and, as appears in our extraordinary Gazette of Cadiz, after his unsuccessful attempt against the capital, he had been compelled to raise the siege.

Proceeding to the Baltic will be stronger than ever.

The French, under the Owen Glendower Captain Selby, sailed yesterday from Porto, and is the convoy for Lisbon and the island, under the Euryalus, 50, Hon. Capt. Selby's brig.

Several French Papers, and Dutch to the effect, inform us, that the French intend to attempt the execution of the Convention, a train of battering artillery is collected, to be employed in attacking the fortifications of Portugal which still hold out.

The French are to be called to Austria. The Emperor of Austria, in the recent marriage, has been a great success. The two memoranda which were presented to each other in the late marriage, were of great merit, and were, in my eyes, that I am proud to have seen a proof of my sentiment.

no less than 300 German Soldiers, who came over to his quarters from the enemies station at Estremadura. A Gottenburgh Mail, and German papers to the 15th, arrive this morning. They have brought no intelligence of importance.

A letter from Cadiz, by the packet, states, that the French prisoners of Dupont's army, on board the prison ships, are dying daily in great numbers.

Reports have been circulated in London and other places, that serious riots have lately taken place in this town and neighbourhood, we take this opportunity of assuring the public, that such representations are without foundation.—*Birmingham Paper.*

Dispatches were received yesterday from Lord Wellington, dated Vizeu the 12th inst. No operation of importance had yet taken place on either side.

The British & French positions in Portugal, are those recommended in a pamphlet written by Gen. Dumourier. The outstanding licenses to import corn, meal, pulse, and burr stones from France and Holland, have been extended to the 18th of June.

The Tyrant is at length so far subdued that the French have put their Conscription Law in force in parts of it.—Several battalions of the Southern division of the country have been united to the 4th, one of the departments.

The Granopus 50, was to sail this morning from Portsmouth for China, with the Surat Castle, Alander Castle, Canton, Bombay, and Royal George, under convoy.

The remains of Lord Collingwood arrived this day at Greenwich Hospital, to lie in state; preparatory, it is supposed, to a grand public funeral.

The two troops of 12th Lt. Dragoons which lately arrived in Banbury, returned to Stanar Barracks.

We learn with regret, that the defect in his Majesty's sight has increased so far as to leave him now in complete darkness. His Majesty is said to have determined to undergo the operation of couching, and which we sincerely hope will have the happy effect of restoring to him the blessing of sight.

The Meeting of the Livery of London, in Common Hall is postponed until Friday next.

Limerick, May 2.

B. Major Harle, of the 15th foot, has been appointed Inspecting Field Officer of the Limerick District, in the room of B. General O'Meara.

The Earl of Kenmare, has arrived at Killarney. The Duchess of Gordon it is said intends visiting the Lake of Killarney, in the course of a few days.

Colonel Eyre (Galway regt.) is on his way to London. The Countess of Clancarty has arrived at Portumna. Lord Valentia is immediately to proceed to the Mediterranean, for recovery of his health.

Mr. John Alley, is elected Alderman of City Dublin. The house of John Parker, Esq. of Cahara Lodge, near Glin, in this County, was on the night of Thursday last attacked, the windows demolished, the door forced open, and articles of furniture and farming utensils broken.

The following also beat five laborers who were in the premises, for the purpose of ploughing and tilling the farm, and charged them to quit the neighbourhood; the attention of an active Magistrate was directed to find out the depredators, but as yet without effect.

Yesterday evening, Mr. John Cantrell, High Constable, apprehended Mich. Moylen, who is charged with different robberies and outrages in this County, he is accused of being the associate of the three persons who were capitally convicted at the last Assizes, and hanged, for the murder of John Neill, at Wighfield; and it is supposed that he is the last of that party remaining in the South of Ireland. The activity of Mr. Cantrell, not only on this occasion, but in every other instance, has been conspicuous; and, except a trifling salary as High Constable, he receives no benefit, nor does he participate in Rewards frequently offered for apprehension of villains;—we hope, that the zealous manner in which he discharges his duty, will meet that recompense from those in power, which the safety and protection of the City of Limerick and its Liberties does imperiously demand.

Yesterday, a detachment from Captain Hastings's Killaloe Garrison Infantry arrived in town, for a supply of arms and ammunition.

Yesterday, the Right Rev. Lord Bishop of Limerick held an Ordination in the Cathedral of this City, when the following Deacons were admitted into the order of Priesthood, v. z. Rev. Stephen Creagh Sanders, A. M. J. T. C. D. Rev. John Warburton, A. B. and Rev. Robert Henson, A. B.

The San Esperase R. De Salis master, from Oporto, with wine & fruit, arrived yesterday at Scattery; the Master reports that a battle was fought, previous to her sailing, on the Frontiers of Portugal, in which the combined forces of the English and two regts. of Portuguese were successful, that Blake with a large army was in possession of Madrid, that the French were retreating from before Cadiz, in all directions and in great confusion.

The Esperase sailed from Oporto on 18th ult. with 23 sail of Merchantsmen, and two men of war, parted company all safe on the 23d inst.—She states, that there were several vessels to leave Oporto and Lisbon, in ballast for Limerick, to take Corn for the troops and inhabitants, the Country being much distressed.

H. M. Sloops P. ridge, Capt. Foot, & Jalouse, Capt. Mors, sailed on Friday, the latter is for Madeira, having under convoy 25 sail, bound for the W. Indies.

His Majesty's Sloops Thracian and Ruttler, with a convoy of 29 sail, bound for different ports, arrived on Saturday, at Cove, from Oporto, from whence they sailed on the 16th inst. and do not bring any intelligence from our army but what has been already received.

Several vessels have arrived in Cork, from Dram, with timber and deals.
