Roman Catholic Meeting.

ENNIS, August 13, 1810.

A NUMEROUS and highly respectable Meeting of the Roman Catholics of this County, was convened at the Court-House on Friday last, at which much animated and enlightened discussion took place. Counsellor O'Connell was present and made an able and animated speech.—Resolutions affecting the interests of the Body at large, and suited to the relative situation and policy of their affairs at this juncture, were entered into and agreed on unanimously. Counsellor O'Gorman in a very forcible and impressive speech stated the deep sense of gratitude which the Catholics of this County felt to their Protestant Brethren, for their truly liberal exertions to procure their Emancipation; he paid a high compliment to Thomas Browne, Esq. the late Sheriff, and to the Fifty Protestants of Clare, who signed the Requisition for the County Meeting to Petition for Catholic Emancipation, an event which has occurred in no other County in Ireland. He concluded by submitting to the Meeting the Consideration of the four following Resolutions, which, on being moved, were unanimously adopted:—

Major WILLIAM SKERRETT, of Finvara, in the Chair.

1. Resolved,—That our most cordial thanks are due and hereby returned to the Rt. Hon. Earl Conyngham, and to our County Representatives, Sir Edw. O'Brien, Bart. and Colonel Augustine Fitz-Gerald, for their patriotic support of the Catholic Claims.

2. Resolved,—That our Thanks are hereby given to the General Committee of the Catholics of Ireland, for their persevering exertions in the Catholic Cause.

3. Resolved,—That a permanent Board of Twenty-One Persons be now appointed to carry into effect our Declaration and Resolutions of last January, to Petition Parliament, SESSIONS AFTER SESSIONS, UNTIL OUR EMANCIPATION SHALL BE ATTAINED.

4. Resolved,—That our Board are hereby authorized and required to empower such of their number as they shall deem necessary, to attend in Dublin or elsewhere, for the purpose of concerting with their Catholic Fellow-subjects, as well the form of a Petition to Parliament

RICHMOND, &c.

WHEREAS the time limited by our Proclamation of the 9th day of January last, prohibiting the transporting into any parts out of Ireland of any Pig-iron, Bar-iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, matts, yards, bowliprite, oars, oakum, sheet-copper, or other naval stores has expired.

And whereas it is judged expedient that the said prohibition should be renewed and continued for some time longer

Now we the Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever do at any time whatsoever do at any time for the space of six months, from the date hereof, presume to transport into any parts out of Ireland, any pig-iron, bar-iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, matts, yards, bowliprite, oars, oakum, sheet-copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores, or do ship or lade any pig-iron, bar-iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, matts, yards, bowliprite, oars, oakum, sheet-copper, sail-cloth or canvas, or other naval stores, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any part beyond the seas, without leave or permission first being had or obtained from the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors and Privy Council of Ireland, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an act passed in Great Britain in the 33rd year of His Majesty's reign, entitled, "an act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council;" but it is nevertheless our pleasure that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels or boats in the service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of any such ship or vessel during the course of her intended voyage, or by licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Great Britain, or to His Majesty's yards or garriisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of St. Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purpose of trade to Great Britain, or to His Majesty's yards and garriisons, or to His Majesty's colonies and plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of St. Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do first make Oath of the true destination of the same to the place for which they shall be entered outwards, before the entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security by bond, (except as herein after excepted,) to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the place for which they are so entered outwards, and for the purposes specified, and none other; and such bond shall not be cancelled
