He warned gentlemen, however, not to quarrel with their bread and butter: by showing, as at present, a little ill temper and vexation, they were depriving themselves of £2000. Mr. Bell gave a history of the manner the castle possessed themselves of the old custom-house. When it ceased to be such, in Lord Westmoreland's administration, the corporation of Dublin undertook to raise a regiment, which were quartered in the first instance in this place. Having left it, however, the city had not manifested its usual anxiety concerning its rights, so that the Barrack Master of Dublin, or some intriguing insolent deputy of his, sent another regiment into the premises, and they have from that period remained in the possession of Government.

The question being put, upon the amendment of Mr. Hart, it was carried without a division. Mr. Willis stated, that very early in the day, insinuations had been thrown out against him by a member of the assembly; he had waited a considerable time for the purpose of knowing what they were.—He wished now, that the Gentleman would step forward and declare what he had to alledge against him.

Mr. Giffard declared himself ready to state his charges against Mr. Willis. he then alluded to the misconduct of which he had been guilty upon a former occasion, of fabricating what he called a Red and Black list of the names of the members who had voted in that assembly by ballot, a mode of discussion adopted for the express purpose of concealing the votes. Yet Mr. Willis, in opposition to the intentions of the mode of ballot, and ignorant as he must have been upon the subject, had taken upon himself to publish what if known should be kept secret. Mr. Giffard stated the report of a committee of Members appointed for the special purpose, so far back as the month of May last, had fixed the charge upon Mr. Willis, Mr. Giffard then noticed the extraordinary interference of Mr. Willis, a member of the corporation of skippers, in presenting a petition against the representative for the brewers' corporation, and imposing upon a weak old man, by a misrepresentation to sign it.

Mr. Giffard then moved "that a committee of five of the commons be appointed to lay before the Recorder a statement of the conduct of John Willis."

Mr. Nugent seconded the motion. A ballot being called for, there appeared, White Beans.....58 Black Beans.....23 In favor of the motion.....35 The assembly was then dissolved.

LIMERICK, JANUARY 22, 1811.

The following letter has been received by Eyre Evans, Esq. High Sheriff of this County: Kildare-street, Dublin, Jan. 16, 1811. Sir—By directions of Lord Norbury, I send you herewith the precept for summoning the Juries for a Special Commission to be held at Limerick, on the 16th day of February next; you will lose no time in giving the necessary notices. I am also to request you will give the prisoners in your Gaol Notice to be ready for their trials on the day the Commission opens. I am, Sir, &c. Wm. KEMMIS.

The City Sheriffs have received similar orders. The Chief Baron, and Lord Norbury are to be the Justices.

In consequence of the very crowded state of the prisons of Waterford and Clonmel, a special commission, we hear, will be held very shortly for the counties of Tipperary and Waterford.

On Sunday night last, at half past nine o'clock, our active High Sheriff proceeded, with his attendants, and a party of the Galway Militia, and scoured the most extensive and populous part of the County, thro' Bruff, Drummin, Garristyne, Bruree, and Kilmallock, and only met one man, against whom they had previous informations:—Gorman, (alias captain Fearnot) charged with robbery and felony—he has been committed to the county jail.

The Parliament was opened on Tuesday last under the authority of the commission agreed upon by the two Houses. The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council the Lord Privy Seal, the Duke of Montrose, and the Earl of Liverpool, acted as commissioners for that purpose. The Lord Chancellor delivered a short speech, calling the attention of Parliament "to the afflicting circumstance of his Majesty's indisposition, and to the necessity of making due and suitable provision for the care of his Majesty's sacred Person, the maintenance of the Royal Dignity, and the exercise of the Royal Authority."

The Regency Bill was read a first time, in the House of Commons, on Tuesday last; on Wednesday, it was read a second time, and ordered to be committed on the following day, without any opposition.—We have received an abstract of the Bill, which shall appear in our next.

On the motion of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the 1st of February, was fixed on as the last day for receiving Bills on private petitions, and the 29th of April, the last day for receiving reports on private Bills.

It is mentioned, in the higher political circles, and with great confidence, that Lord Moira is to be Lord Lieutenant and commander in chief. The Right Hon. Maurice Fitzgerald, Knight of Kerry, to be Chief Secretary.

Next Friday, being appointed by the Church to be kept holy, the Lecture at the Cathedral will be given on Saturday next, at the usual hour.

THE ARMY.

It is said that Lord Paget's regiment, the seventh Hussars, at present in Dublin, are to remove their quarters to the county of Tipperary, and that they are to be replaced by the 19th dragoons from Longford.

The Drummers, Bugles, &c. of the different Yeomanry corps in Ireland, have been ordered to join the regiments in their vicinity, to do duty for one month, or until they are reported to be perfectly qualified for service.

Colonel Fuller, of the guards, with several other officers, have arrived at Portsmouth, to embark for Portugal.

Detachments of the following regiments are waiting at Plymouth for transports to convey them to Portugal, viz the 13th, 14th, and 16th Light Dragoons, 2d Dragoon Guards, 4th Dragoons, and 1st German Legion Hussars. Others are on the road for Plymouth.

A detachment of the Guards, as well as detachments of several regiments, will embark in the course of this week, for Portugal.

The 11th regiment, 2d battalion, is under orders to embark from Guernsey for Portugal.

A detachment of the first and second battalions of the 4th regiment of foot, are on their march for Portsmouth to embark for Portugal.

About 150 of the royal artillery drivers have embarked at Portsmouth for Portugal. The detachments of the royal waggon train, destined for the same place, are still waiting at Portsmouth for transports.

About 150 men passed through Portsmouth on Friday, for the Isle of Wight, and proceeded to Bexhill, to join the King's German Legion.

It is with great satisfaction we state that the brave Colonel Barclay, who was wounded in both legs, at the battle of Busaco, is so far recovered, as to be able to remove from Portsmouth, where he has been remaining for the last eight weeks. Mr. Moore, surgeon, brother to the late Sir John Moore, went down from London for the purpose of attending him on his journey.—He has a cot fixed in a spring carriage, with four horses.

Gen. Tarleton's regiment, the 21st dragoons, which has been stationed at the Cape for some time, was ordered to proceed to India.
