On Saturday last, in the vicinity of Quinpool, near this city, an atrocious and deliberate murder was committed, aggravated, if possible, by a subsequent circumstance of a truly diabolical nature—the particulars of which we understand to be as follows: a dealer of the name of McNamara alias Chun, had lurked for some time in the neighbourhood, and through that misplaced good nature which is too often manifested by the lower orders towards fellows of his description, he not only found a kind reception, but actually gained the confidence of many.—Among others who harboured this miscreant, was a man named Griffin, an industrious, unsuspecting creature—On the above day, Griffin accompanied by his wife came to market, having first unfortunately committed his little habitation, in which his son, (about 11 years of age), remained to the care of this treacherous monster, who in the course of the day, rose upon the boy, and, apparently with some oblique weapon, fractured his skull in several places—plunder, which seems to have been the original object, immediately succeeded this cold-blooded enormity; the house was now rilled, and set fire to by this miscreant who made his escape, taking with him several of the most portable articles, together with twenty guineas in Bank Notes, which he discovered in a chest or box—the volumes of smoke which issued from the house, attracted the notice of a passenger, who alarmed the neighbourhood—crowd's collected and the flames were soon extinguished—but great indeed must have been the horror of the spectators on discovering the mangled carcass of the boy, which was evidently designed by this extraordinary delinquent to have been consumed to ashes.

On Saturday last about the hour of one o'clock, an unhappy accident occurred at Ballyrolane in the liberties of this city. We learn that the following is the most correct statement:

A young man had borrowed a fowling-piece from a neighbouring game-keeper, in order to shoot some crows which were injuring a new field of wheat, lately sown, and standing behind a ditch he levelled at the crows; unfortunately at the very moment, a man of the name of Ryan and his wife, were crossing a stile in order to make a short cut, and the instant he crossed he received the shot; he was wounded in three places, one of which was mortal, and after languishing all that day, died in the greatest agony on Sunday evening.—On his death bed he acquitted the young man of any malice intent, but attributed it merely to accident.

A PROCLAMATION.—RICHMOND, &c.

WHEREAS it appears to us by an inquest taken on the body of William Henderson, late a corporal in his Majesty's 90th regiment of foot, that the said William Henderson was barbarously and inhumanly murdered on the 13th day of November last, by a musket ball fired at him by some person in a mob consisting of several persons unknown, near the town of Tempo, in the county of Fermanagh, while doing his duty in aid of one of the officers of his Majesty's regiment.

Now we the lord lieutenant and council of Ireland being determined, as far as in us lies, to bring the perpetrators of said barbarous murder to speedy and condign punishment, do hereby publish and declare, that if any person or persons shall, within six calendar months from the date hereof, discover any of the persons concerned in the said murder, so as that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof, such person or persons shall receive as a reward the sum of £100 sterling for the first three persons concerned in the said murder.

And we do hereby further publish and declare, that if any person or persons, concerned in the said murder, except the person who fired the shot whereby the said William Henderson was killed, shall within the time aforesaid discover any of the person or persons concerned in the same, so as that such person or persons so discovered shall be convicted thereof, such person so discovering shall over and above the said reward, receive his Majesty's most gracious pardon for the said offence.

And we do hereby strictly charge and command all justices of the peace, mayors, sheriffs, bailiffs, constables, and all other his Majesty's loving subjects, to be aiding and assisting in discovering and apprehending the persons concerned in said barbarous and inhuman murder.

the course of her intended voyage, or by the lord high admiral of Great Britain, or signers of the admiralty for the time being exportation of the said several articles to or to his Majesty's yards or garrisons, or to his Majesty's colonies and plantations in America, India, or to Newfoundland, or to his Majesty's settlements on the coast of Africa, or of St. Helena, or to the British settlement in the East Indies: Provided that upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes aforesaid, the person or persons so exporting the same, shall be bound to give oaths of the same to the places for which they were intended, before the entry of the same into the said places, and to give full and sufficient security (except as herein after excepted,) to the satisfaction of the commissioners of his Majesty's customs, for the safe and lawful importation of the said articles to the places for which they were intended, and for the purposes aforesaid, and such bonds shall not be cancelled until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said commissioners, by the production, without exception, of a certificate or certificates, in such manner as shall be directed by the said commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been actually used at the places for which they were intended, but it is our pleasure, nevertheless, that the said articles, viz. Bar-iron, white and tarred iron, mill grease, tarpaulins for waggon covers, and turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported into by the merchant exporter, to any of his Majesty's plantations in the West Indies, or to any of his Majesty's settlements in South America: and the merchant exporter shall first verify upon oath, that the said articles so exported are intended for the particular plantation or settlement to be named in the said certificate, and not for sale, and that the said plantation or settlement has not before been furnished with a supply of the said articles during the same year, provided also, that the exportation of the said articles shall in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, and that the same shall be shipped by one or more shipments with the same merchant.

And the commissioners of his Majesty's customs shall give the necessary directions herein as respectively appertain.
