Lieutenant-colonel Keating, who was shot through the leg, at the successful attack on the isle of France, under the command of General Abercrombie, was when the last dispatches came away, in a fair way of recovery. The gallant Officer commanded the reserve and remained at the head of his brigade a considerable time after he was wounded, and until the enemy ceased to make further resistance. The Governor-General in Council, Lord Minto, has, in the most honourable manner recorded his former services at Bourbon, of which island Col. Keating is appointed Lieutenant Governor Commandant; and where, in conjunction with his brave and distinguished friend, Captain Rowley, he compelled the French to lay down their arms and surrender prisoners of war.
