News from Portugal.

A packet in 15 days from Cadiz has been received, and the Princess Elizabeth packet from Lisbon. The former, we are con- siderably brought accounts that 147 sail of Cadiz had suffered severely from a storm which lasted from the 27th to the 29th and were driven on shore and totally destroyed. The other part of the others were driven on shore and feared have sustained much damage. The Princess Elizabeth returned when the packet sailed. The latter, which was to have brought the Princess Elizabeth and her foremast and bowsprit in the hands of the crew, was blown out the sea by the war, and the gale without the crew being able to add that of the vessels hands were lost.

Lisbon is of importance. The printed intelligence to the 7th inst. and in one of them from Lord Wellington to the Portuguese, dated the 27th ult. It is almost the same as the dispatch of the same date from the same source published in the Gazette of last week.

Information from the North of Spain has received orders to return to "WELLINGTON."

Before us it appears that the enemy are proceeding to attack them in their rear, and precipitately fled from them on the route, not of Almeida, but in the way to Placentia and Ciudad Rodrigo, and evacuated Portugal.

It is stated, and there appears to be a general opinion, that the corps of the enemy were at Celerico on the 30th.

Reports by the Chesterfield state, that about 1400 men, have been made prisoners by the English army. They also state that, if correct, discredits entirely the report of the Guernsey some days ago. Marshal Massena had been put under arrest, and sent to the island of St. Helena began his retreat.

OFFICIAL DETAILS.

A bulletin on the subject of the intelligence from Portugal, has been circulated in the following terms:

"War Department, April 18.

Last night received from Lord Wellington, April 2. His Lordship collected his army near Celerico upon the left bank of the river, with a view to dislodge the enemy. He seemed inclined to maintain the position, but on the morning of the 3rd, a general attack was made, and the enemy was driven with some loss. Brigade-Major Stuart, of the 1st Division, was killed.

On the 29th, Lord Wellington attacked the position of Guarda but did not succeed, and without firing a shot, and re- turned to the river. The cavalry pursued and took some prisoners.

Sir William Erskine, with the cavalry, fell upon the rear of the enemy, and making some prisoners. On the 30th, the British were in a position on the coast, and on the 31st instant, upon the left bank of the river.

It transmits an account of Marshal Massena's action with the enemy near the 25th March. The French force consisted of 10000 men, including regiments of cavalry and three regiments of horse artillery. The British force was 10000 men. The enemy was defeated with the loss of 5 or 600 men. The British loss was 24 killed, 69 wounded, and 1000 prisoners. A British officer was killed.

PLYMOUTH, APRIL 14.—A Spanish merchant ship arrived here last night from New-York, and brings accounts from thence four days later than those received by the Adventure packet. By this conveyance I received two American papers of the 13th and 14th ult. These contain additional accounts of the seizure and condemnation of a number of British vessels, which with their cargoes, had been sold by public auction at New York, Charlestown, and Baltimore. In fact there appears no hope of an adjustment of the differences existing between this country and America, and all the accounts agree in representing an immediate war as inevitable.
