

westward, pursued by two luggers, one of which came within a quarter of a mile of the shore, and was fired at by the whole range of batteries, but without effect, it is feared, receiving any injury, and continued pursuing the merchant vessels which, with the other lugger, were soon out of sight, being cloudy; and I am sorry to announce that five vessels* were driven on shore by the enemy, under the south Foreland, only one of which has been got off, the others all bilged. One schooner was taken, and most probably got off to Calais, the wind blowing strong from the westward. Early this morning two more luggers were off here, and went close alongside a large ship, but whether they did not like her appearance or whatever other cause, they sheered off, and the ship went safe into the Downs.—Wind West, and blows strong, with thick weather.

EAST INDIA HOUSE.

By the Wellesley packet, which is arrived at Plymouth from the Isle of France and touched at St. Helena the 17th March, accounts have been received here that an account had been received at that island from an American ship, called the Coromandel, which left Bengal the 26th December, that the extra ship Sovereign was appointed to proceed with dispatches for England, that the Georgiana packet was to touch at the Cape on her way to England, and that the Harriett, Sir Wm. Bunsley, Iudus, Ann and Midas, were to be dispatched for England as soon as loaded.

According to a Bengal Paper, dated 19th of December, no accounts respecting the ship Ocean had been received at Canton so late as the 1st of November.

The Recovery whaler, from Dassen Island, bound for England, arrived at St. Helena the 3d March.

The Exeter was at Bombay in November, and nearly loaded, when she was expected to be dispatched to join the fleet bound for England.

Yesterday at twelve o'clock his Majesty came to Windsor Terrace, accompanied by Dr. Heberden and Mr. Dundas and walked till one, when he retired to dine.—At two o'clock his Majesty resumed his afternoon's walk in the Terrace, accompanied by Lord St. Helen's and General Gwynne, and walked till four.

A cabinet council sat yesterday at the Secretary of State's office, during the whole of the afternoon.

LONDON—THURSDAY, MAY 2.

The Whiting schooner has arrived at Plymouth from Cadiz, which place she left eleven days ago.—Dispatches from the Honorable Mr. Wellesley, our ministers to the Cortes, which came by her were received. Lord Liverpool's office this morning, but their contents are not important. Cadiz was still in a tolerable state of tranquility.

We have more than once taken occasion to express our disgust at the drivelling manner in which the Spanish Civil and Military Chiefs have conducted themselves in the grand struggle for the liberties of Europe.—The letters by the Cadiz Mail exhibit a deplorable picture of the state of affairs at the seat of Government. Dissidents have proceeded so far that a Member of the Cortes, whose person by his office is sacred from arrest, has been seized and imprisoned in the Castle of St. Sebastian, and it was intended that two more Members that body should receive the same treatment on the following day.

Every Member of the Junta is dissatisfied with his situation: no cordiality, no harmony exists among them. A public virtue, which seemed at one time to animate their speeches and to promise the regeneration of Spain now crushed by the spirit of party, and the Hall of Cortes now resounds with the cry of clamours and content, instead of the acclamations of patriotism and liberty.
