COURT OF KING'S BENCH, DUBLIN. The King v. Lord Louth.

Lord Louth was tried at the last Assizes of Bondalk upon an indictment containing two counts—the first charging his Lordship with subornation of perjury, and the last, of mal-practices as a Magistrate. He was acquited upon the first but found guilty upon the secoud; and on Friday last he appeared in the court of King's Bench to receive sentence. Upon this occasion Mr. Scriven addressed their Lordships as follows :-

My Lords, on the crown side of the court, I am bumbly to move, that Lord Louth be brought up to receive the judgment of the court.

Mr. M'Cartney .- Your Lordships are informed that Lord Louth has made an affidavit in unitigation of punishment. That affidavit has been answered, but in the answer, a new fact, reflecting highly on the charact ter of Lord Louth, has been introduced, which never appeared before the court. . The fact in this: the par; ties state, that their father, who was agent to Lord Louth's grandfather, had entered into security for the late Lord Louth-and that they were obliged to paya large sum of money for his grandfather.

Chief Justice.-What happened to Lord Louth's grandfather does not apply to his criminality; and we do not sit here either to hear or answer public clamour of any kind whatever.

Mr. M. Cartney .- I trust your Lordships will give us liberty to answer that part of the affidavit.

Mr. Dufin. Mr. M Carthy was remarkable for his great stature, bulk, and strength, which being united w. h a courage no less singular, rendered extremly furmidable when provoked by insult, though, like most men so gilted, he was by his natural disposition extremely placed, good humoured, and forbearing .-His latter years; passed in the tranquillity of private life, exhibited alternate vicissitudes of generous, but extravagant, and thoughtless, hospitality; and of distress often bordefing on want; which, however, could not subdue his spirit, or destroy his cheerfulness -Mr. M'Charty was a native of the County of Cork, and although he had been absent from his country tor above 30 years, during the earlier part of which he resided on the Continent, he always retained a sincere and ardent affection for his native land.
